PROVINCIAL RIFLE MATCHES CONCLUDED YESTERDAY

The provincial rifle matches were completed yesterday under splendid conditions, and the meeting was voted by all who took part as one of the best that has been held for many years. The arrangements made by Caretaker Smith under the direction of Lt. Col. H. Leigh were all that could be desired while Capt. Allan acted as range officer satisfied all competitors by the capable and courteous manner in which he conducted the shooting. The scoring throughout the three days was of a very high order, in fact it was very exceptional. Capt. A. W. Allan who won the Governor General's medal and the Ottawa Aggregate only dropped 19 points in three days of shooting. This was most extraordinary marksmanship and would have been effective in the grand aggregate at Bisley or anywhere. The scores of Sgt. G. G. McLennan, Pt. P. Hooper and R. L. Coles are also very creditable.

The Corporation Match, ten shots at 500 yards was fired in the morning and was won by Percy Hooper with a score of 50 points which is the possible. There were many other good scores in this match. In the afternoon the Silver Black Fox Match, ten shots at an eight inch bull's eye at 300 yards was fired. The possible is 50 points and Lt. J. S. Moore scored 49 or almost a possible. Capt. Allan also scored 49 and there were several forty eights—truly wonderful shooting. Last year this same match was won by S. C. Moore, father of Lt. Moore, this year's winner.

The special aggregate comprises the total scores of the leading competitors in all matches except the Silver Black Fox Match. The first two received the Governor General's medal. Capt. A. W. Allan, M. C. G. was awarded the Governor-General's silver medal with the magnificent score of 342 out of a possible 360 points. Sgt. G. G. McLennan, another of our crack riflemen and one who made such a remarkable shoot on the Inter-Maritime Rifle team this year was second, winning the bronze medal with a score of 334 points.

The Ladies Challenge Trophy Match was the last event on the program, the 36 riflemen with the highest aggregates competing in it for thirty-six ladies. The shooting was very keen and when all had fired it was found that Capt. A. W. Allan, A. Gormley and A. O. F. Gill had each scored 49 points out of a possible 50. They were shooting for Mrs. J. R. Allan, Mrs. Blackmore and Miss E. Hobbs respectively. In the shoot-off, Capt. Allan was victorious, and Mrs. J. R. Allan will have the custody of the Ladies Challenge Trophy for 1927.

The Ottawa Aggregate. This consists of the thirty highest scorers in the three days of matches. The winner, Capt. A. W. Allan, M. C. G. will receive the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association Silver Medal while Sgt. G. G. McLennan will receive the bronze medal. The first fifteen will comprise the Ottawa team and they will each receive ten dollars towards expenses contributed by the Association. In closing the Guardian congratulates the president of the Provincial Rifle Association, Lt. Col. H. M. Davison, R.O.V.D. on the excellent marksmanship displayed during the shoot and the thoroughly efficient manner in which the whole meeting was staged. He can certainly be proud of the remarkable rifle shots which are being developed here, not only shown by the results of the meeting but by the winning of the Inter-Maritime trophy this year from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick with a new record.

The thanks of the association are due the E. Bddy Co., through its representative, Mr. S. C. Moore for contributing a five dollar bill to the rifleman securing the most bull's eyes in the Prowse match. Capt. A. W. Allan has the bill. Following are results:
