To Wash White Silk

White silk blouses, handkerchiefs and ties are all washed in the same way. Dissolve some borax in hot water and let it cool but not get quite cold, and lay the goods in it to steep for half an hour; have ready a lather of warm water and soap, preferably Castile Soap, and wash them, but rub as little as possible and only between the hands. Rinse well first in blue water and then in clean water. Do not wring, but press between the hands, fold each article smooth, and lay in a clean cloth, press two or three times through the wringer, and iron on the wrong side. If a little methylated spirits is added to the last rinsing water, in the proportion of a dessert spoonful to a pint of water, it will make the silk look glossy and smooth. IMMIGRATION PLANS OF SALVATION ARMY

Would Transport Tens of Thousands of Englishmen to English Colonies—Would Co-operate With the United States.

CLEVELAND, O., April 14.—Before leaving for the east yesterday, Commander Booth Tucker, who, with H. Rider Haggart, the author, is making an inspection of the social colony work done by the Salvation Army in the United States, outlined the plan of the Salvation Army to relieve the congestion in population in London by emigrating persons to Canada and other English colonies. He said: "Last year the Salvation Army carried 10,000 persons from England to Canada, which is startling for the population. We carried them in our own ships. It will not be long before we shall be carrying Englishmen not by thousands but by tens of thousands, not only to Canada but to New Zealand, Australia and South Africa. We did not dump our immigrants in Quebec, as the United States government dumps them in, but dropped six here and eight there and a dozen in another place wherever they were needed. Every man who left England for Canada knew before he started where he was going, what he was going to work at and what wages he was to receive. The United States should revise its immigration laws. Though its consuls and other representatives immigrants should be investigated before they start. Then you could get the cream of Europe, the yeomanry, the healthy, sturdy stock, and not the scum, the near-do-wells. The Salvation Army would like to co-operate with the United States government in a work of this kind. Then colonization could be made the handmaid of immigration."

CREW BURNED BULWARKS TO KEEP WARM

True Story of Japanese Capture of Steamer Tacoma, of Seattle.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 15.—In a letter written to a friend in the city Otto Daniels, chief engineer of the Northwestern S. S. Company's steamer Tacoma which was captured by Japanese cruisers while attempting to run the blockade to Vladivostok, dispels the mystery which has surrounded the history of that craft since leaving this port on January 6th. Daniels states that the officers of the steamer knew that they were bound for the Siberian port and their cargo was contraband. He says that some of the officers were only prevailed upon to make the voyage by the promises of the Russian agent aboard the steamer. The crew did not know their destination until the steamer reached Dutch harbor. When they found it out they threatened to desert the ship and mutiny was only avoided by the diplomacy of the Russian agent who promised them a small fortune if the attempt was successful. The writer states that when the Tacoma was fast in the ice and drifting about, the crew were forced to burn parts of the steamer's superstructure to keep warm and were obliged to subsist for a part of the time on beef intended for the Russians. Daniels says that after being captured, the entire crew were treated with the utmost kindness by the Japanese who were in possession of the names and position of every member almost from the moment of the steamer leaving this port.

BIG OLD-HOME WEEK.

It Will be Held at Charlottetown the Capital City of Prince Edward Island, In July. (Boston Globe, April 13th)

ARCHIBALD IRWIN, secretary of the Prince Edward Island development and tourist association, is visiting Boston in the interest of the big old-home week celebration which it is proposed to hold at Charlottetown, the capital city of the province, this summer.

The old-home week idea was successfully inaugurated at Summerside P. E. I. last year, a fortnight being given up to the observance, and the people of Charlottetown have now become enthused and propose to hold one of the largest and best reunions that have ever been held in the maritime provinces.

The "home-comers' week and summer carnival" as it is officially designated, will be held about the last week in July, the exact date not yet having been fixed, and will be under the auspices of the development and tourist association.

An elaborate program is being arranged including a military and naval parade, athletic sports, yacht races, entertainments and illuminations. Invitations have been issued to British, American and French warships to visit Charlottetown during the celebration and it is expected that each of these nations will be represented.

Mr. Irwin, who will make his headquarters at the Crawford house during his stay here, is desirous of meeting natives of Prince Edward Island residing in this vicinity who would like to participate in the reunion. He hopes to secure special excursion rates from the transportation companies, and if a sufficient number indicate their desire to go, a special train will be run from Boston for their accommodation.

"Your New England old-home week idea is a grand good thing, and we hope to make our Prince Edward Island observance as successful as the one in Massachusetts and New Hampshire have been," said Mr. Irwin yesterday.
