FAME AND THAT SORT OF THING The relation of mental exertion to longevity has long been a source of considerable speculation. A man dies at a comparatively early age and speculation at once becomes busy as to the cause. Conclusions are arrived at which statistics do not bear out. Hard work, even what is usually called overwork, it is safe to say, has never killed its man. Idleness has. More people rust out than wear out. The Dictionary of National Biography, gives the names of all the famous people in Great Britain. A supplement recently completed adds the names of 1635 people who have died between 1901 and 1911. This supplement is interesting from several viewpoints. First as to fame and longevity. Of these 1635 men and women the average length of life attained was about seventy years. Nearly four hundred died after their eightieth birthday and of these four were centenarians. It cannot therefore be unfair to conclude that sustained intellectual effort is no bar to longevity. Another interesting fact revealed by this compilation is that the proportion of famous people to the common crowd remains about the same throughout many generations. Each of the eleven years covered by this supplement yields 150 recruits and

WILL NEVER DO IT ANY MORE. This is the time of year when resolutions are in order, not the "moved, seconded and carried unanimously" variety, but the personal resolution in which one resolves, after a thoughtful retrospect of the year, "never to do it any more." We are opening a new book which a year hence, perhaps sooner, will be closed forever. Its pages today are clean and spotless. It has room for entries which, a year hence, may be read over without regret; room for entries which, if made, would, a year hence, bring the blush of shame to our cheeks, cause the bitterest remorse and, worst of all, the blush and the remorse would be vain. The moving finger writes, and, having writ, moves on, and all your piety and wit will not avail to change a line nor all your tears wipe out a word of it." The entries will all be made, the book-keeper is inexorable and the record unchangeable. It is well then to pause and think seriously as this 1913 volume is being opened and as we look on the clean first page. The volume will stand alone. The last volumes may have been blotted, may have been disfigured, may be full of entries which we would fain remove but cannot. These have no connection with and no influence over the new volume now opened. The year 1913 will not be held accountable for the errors of 1912. It is a second chance and the balance at the close of the year will be struck between the debits and credits of the year. If there is a credit balance shown it will help to reduce the adverse balances of former years, but the year's work will stand alone and be closed into the Profit and Loss Account. Let us begin the book right, let us guard against the first blot, against the first debit entry. The credits will be few enough, the profit little enough after we have done our best. There is one sense in which there is a relation between the new book and the old and it must be reckoned with on beginning the new. In making up our former volumes we acquired habits. The stains and the blots and the debit entries are the result of habit. In the great majority of the volumes closed and laid away comparatively few of the charges are on account of deliberate wrongdoing. The proportion of actual criminals is, after all, very small. The number of persons who are called before the courts is infinitesimal, but the errors, the sins of omission and of commission, the lapses, the wrongdoing through thoughtlessness or selfishness, are innumerable. An inspection of the way we have come, then, will be helpful. We can see, although we cannot recall, the errors and the wrongs. We can see why we yielded to the tempter, can see wherein we could have shunned the pitfall, wherein we could have throttled a habit before it throttled us, and on this seeing we can form our New Year's resolution for 1913, each for himself. RURAL DELIVERY. Information has been received that a couple of rural mail boxes on the "Canoes Cove and New Haven" route were maliciously destroyed early on Sunday morning the 15th. inst. and an effort is being made to locate the guilty parties. In the meantime it would be well that the public should fully understand the seriousness of the offense of interfering in any way with a street letter box, a rural mail box or any box or receptacle for the deposit of letters or other mailable matter. The law covering the matter is found in Section 510 of the Criminal Code, sub-section D, clause C, which reads as follows: "Every one is guilty of the indictable offense of mischief who willfully destroys or damages any street letter box pillar-box or other receptacle established by Authority of the Postmaster General for the deposit of letters or other mailable matter and is liable to five years imprisonment." The Post Office Inspector will prosecute all parties against whom there is sufficient evidence to warrant a conviction as the practice of interfering with rural boxes must be stamped out immediately. It has also been ascertained that some rural patrons or other parties who use rural boxes have taken advantage of these boxes for mailing letters with stamps thereon which have been previously used. Several cases of this kind have come to the attention of Postmasters and the letters have been promptly forwarded to the Dead Letter Office. The fine for mailing a letter with a previously used stamp thereon is \$10.00 and if this practice is continued an example will have to be made of the guilty party. The full equipment for couriers on rural routes has recently been distributed and in future couriers must, under the Regulations, accept and deliver registered matter, sell postage stamps and take applications for money orders and postal notes. The courier must buy his stamps from the distributing office in every case. The Department desires that patrons on a
