RUBY AUBREY WON BIG MATCH RACE IN SUMMERSIDE

Over 1,000 People See Wm. Clarke's Mare, Driven by Mack Steele Take 2 of the 3 Heats From Soldier Lady. A Race That Will Long be Remembered. Two Other Good Classes on Program.

SUMMERSIDE Feb. 26. — Not since the day of the Hernando-Brown race has there been such interest in a horse race as was evidenced in the match race for a \$1000 side bet held in Summerside Saturday, when Ruby Aubrey, 2:24 1-4 owned by William Clarke, Summerside, and Soldier Lady 2:23 1-4 owned by George Dennis, Margate, were matched for the best two out of three heats. From early morning sleigh loads of people from east and west of Summerside streamed into town, all the time in coming roads showing a steady procession of lovers of horse racing.

Every available stand for a horse was taken up before noon and all the sheds were occupied and many had to seek quarters outside the regular places for their horses.

People from Charlottetown to O'Leary and further to the number of over 1000 were present to view a race that was well worth coming miles to see.

In the first heat of the match race when Mack Steele the capable pilot of Ruby Aubrey and Tendie Semple, with the fast daughter of British Soldier drove to the starting point the interest was fever heat.

The horses got away abreast, but the pacer Soldier Lady had the lead for the 1st quarter, but Ruby Aubrey made a gradual but sure advance from the quarter to the wire and finished half a length in front.

In the second heat Soldier Lady again took the lead and Mack was gaining slightly when Ruby broke badly and only joggled in. Soldier Lady winning the heat easily.

Now the excitement ran high as each horse had a heat, there were many opinions offered among the spectators some saying that the Aubrey mare would be sure to break in the next heat if the same fast pace was maintained and so on.

In the third and final heat the horses got away together with Soldier Lady in the lead. At the quarter Ruby Aubrey was gaining and it was a pretty race to the finish. Both drivers were whipping their horses and continued laying the gad till the wire was reached, Ruby Aubrey came under the wire the winner by a few feet, winning the heat and the race. Three cheers followed for Bill Clarke, the owner of Ruby Aubrey.

Although it was disappointing for the admirers of Soldier Lady they all said it was a great race, fair and square in every way in the last heat neither horse lifted a nose from wire to wire and such a race has not been seen for many a day.

Mack Steele was heartily congratulated by a great many of the spectators and he truly deserved it as he showed his generalship and ability all the way through. He certainly knows how to handle Ruby Aubrey.

Tendie Semple also deserves high commendation as he reined the brown mare well and drove her for all that was in her Saturday. The time in first heat was 1:04 1-2 the time for the second heat was 1:04 1-4 and the 3rd and final heat was in 1:04. The match race was supplemented by an excellent programme of races.

There were two classes, Class A and Class B. In Class A it was a battle between Princess Aubrey, owned and driven by Theodore Waite, Summerside, and Lois Guy owned and driven by Layton Rogers, Kensington.

The first heat went to Princess Aubrey while in the second heat Lois Guy came in ahead. In the third heat was won by Princess Aubrey giving her the race and first money. Lois Guy was second in the heat and got second money. Little Bell owned by Ray Lidstone, Freetown, and driven by George Campbell, after winning in the first, in the 2nd heat after going neck and neck with the winner Little Bell met with an accident and had to be drawn.

Class B. In the Class B race Campbellton Bell owned by B. W. McArthur, easily captured the first two heats and first money. Harry H., and British Guy raced off for 2nd money. Harry H. owned by Stanley Howatt, winning the heat and 2nd money and British Guy owned by Dr. Thompson, securing 2nd money. The following is the summary:—
