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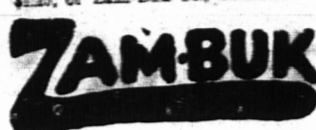

At the close of this most entertaining and enjoyable program bells were heard approaching and in a short time Santa made his appearance and after distributing to the great delight of the school children the many presents with which the Christmas
