Nine lives are reported lost.

500,000,000 Marks

Due Belgium at the End of Year

PARIS, Sept. 21.—Belgium under her priority in reparation will be entitled to 500,000,000 marks gold in addition to the 270,000,000 marks to be paid here by Germany in discountable notes in the next few days according to estimates by the reparations experts. This 500,000,000 marks is a comparatively rough estimate of the amount that will be due Belgium at the end of this year after allowance has been made for probable German deliveries of merchandise.

Australia Winning British Emigrant

LONDON, Sept. 21.—A notable feature of the British official emigration returns today is Australia's success in winning British emigrants. The first six months of 1922, as compared with 1921, show an increase of 4,846 British emigrants to Australia and New Zealand as against a decrease of 20,265 to Canada and a decrease of 17,530 to the United States. Females represent 47 per cent of the total British emigrants.

Kills His Young Wife, Her Mother And Shoots Self

BANGOR, Me., Sept. 21.—That section of the town of Kenduskeag known as Higginsville was the scene of a double murder and an attempted suicide late Thursday afternoon when Adelbert W. Wilson, proprietor of a small store at Higginsville, shot and killed his young wife, Nellie, and her mother, Mrs. Lettie Darling, and then after killing his oldest son and a neighbor of the shooting, turned the gun on himself and inflicted a wound in his left breast which may prove fatal. Wilson was taken to the Eastern Maine General where he was reported as being on the dangerous list. Wilson's brother, Eugene, was taken to the Bangor State Hospital after the tragedy for observation. Eugene having talked strangely concerning the affair. The double murder was one of the most brutal crimes that Sheriff Fernandez has ever had to deal with. The tragedy was the culmination of domestic troubles which have been existing for some time and jealousy is believed to have been the ultimate cause for the shooting. Wilson, who is forty-nine years of age, married Miss Nellie Darling about ten years ago. Miss Darling being sixteen years of age at the time of the marriage. Wilson had previously been married and had two children by his first wife. His second wife's mother, Mrs. Lettie Darling, came to live with her and his wife and during the ensuing years his wife gave birth to four children. It is understood that Wilson was very jealous of his wife.

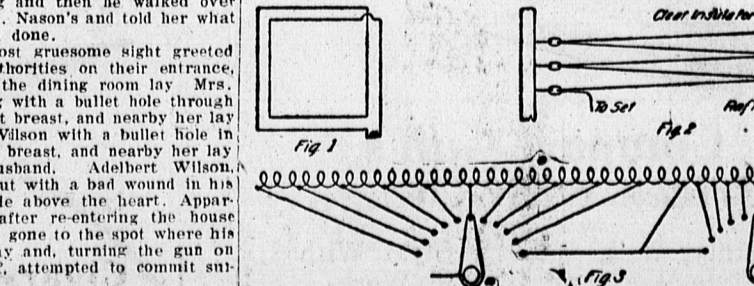

How to Construct and Operate a Radio Telephone Receiving Set

By Harry F. Dart, Compiler of the Radio Operator's Course for the International Correspondence Schools

ARTICLE 5.—Operating Hints. When trying to pick up a station it is important that the instructions of the maker of the apparatus employed be carefully observed. The following general rules may be followed in any case: The cat whisker should first be placed on a sensitive spot on the crystal. For a test to determine when this condition obtains, it is desirable to use a small buzzer operated by a dry cell and the whole enclosed in a sound-proof box. The buzzer should then be coupled to the receiving transformer so as to produce pulsating currents in that circuit. The cat whisker is then moved to various positions on the crystal until a point is found where the buzzer sounds loudest as heard in the telephone receivers. The buzzer may then be stopped and tuning started. Couple the primary and secondary coils of the receiving transformer close by moving them close together. Then with any arbitrary number of turns in these two circuits move the variable condensers over their range of values. If the desired station is not heard, another combination of the receiving transformer turns should be used and the condensers again varied. When the desired station is received, the coupling between the primary and secondary coils should be decreased and the other settings remade so as to get as clear signals as possible. With an electron-tube detector, it is not necessary to use the buzzer test, but the remainder of the procedure is the same. In congested districts and even in switch (a) is arranged so as to others, it is often desirable to construct an antenna in a limited space. One of the most convenient ways of doing this is to use a loop or coil changes in this case, by individual turns of No. 22 double-cotton-covered copper wire.
