A MASSACHUSETTS paper says J. R. Cowans, of Springhill, paid \$2,000 for the mare Lady Paton with a first mark of 2.10 on a mile track.

The death took place in New Glasgow, N. S., of Mrs. Thomas Henderson. Among the daughters are Mrs. Waterman, Charlottetown.

On Saturday all the New York sugar refineries advanced their prices on all grades of refined sugar 10 cents per 100 lbs. This advance will likely be followed by Canadian firms.

The Prince Edward Islanders appear to have secured a favorable consideration of their case at Ottawa. They do not overstate the case when they say the Island should have an ice-breaking steamer and later on, a tunnel.—St. John Telegraph.

HON. Mr. Hughes has given notice in the Legislature of a bill to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Development and Tourist Association and Hon. Mr. Peters has given notice of a bill which he will introduce Monday to provide for the Consolidation of the Debt of the Province.

A. B. McLEOD, representing The Berlin Robe & Clothing Co. Ltd., Berlin, Ont., was in the city yesterday. He reports business specially good in his territory, the Maritime Provinces. He carries a good serviceable line of fur and fur lined coats in addition to the popular Berlin goods.

HENRY J. CUNNINGHAM, ex-chief of police of Cambridge, addressed the Canadians of Quincey Thursday evening on the subject of "Organization in Politics." The lecture was given under the auspices of the Provincial Club and a concert and dance followed.—Boston Post. Mr. Cunningham is a native of Missoquoi, P. E. I.

On the graduating class of thirteen at Pine Hill, Halifax, this year, six of them are to be located in the Presbytery of Miramichi, as follows: Rev. R. H. Stavert, Wilmet Valley, P. E. I. at Harcourt; Rev. C. Kent, at Doaktown; Rev. A. J. Stuart at New Brandon; Rev. J. Ormiston, at New Carlisle; Rev. H. J. Fraser, at Loggieville, and Rev. A. J. Myers, Lake Verde, P. E. I., at Black River.

At a large meeting of Eclipse Division, No. 208, Sons of Temperance, New Haven the following resolution was unanimously carried. Whereas the Grand Division of P. E. I. have passed a resolution amending the prohibition law; Therefore resolved that Eclipse Division fully endorses the amendments proposed by the Grand Division, and earnestly urges our representatives, Messrs. MacMillan and Douglas, to use all means at their disposal to have said amendments passed by the House.

The firemen were called out yesterday morning about a quarter after five. The fire was in the rear shop of W. A. Hutcheson's confectionery store, Grafton Street. The blaze which had originated from the furnace was discovered by Watchman Merchant after some search induced by his having smelled smoke in that vicinity. The Brigade was quickly out and a little water sufficed to extinguish the flames which fortunately had not made great headway. The rear shop was badly gutted by the water and considerable material ruined.

P. E. ISLAND potatoes are now very plentiful and they are selling at the wharves for about 35 cents. New Brunswick are quoted at \$1.45 for three bushel bags; barrels \$1.50. A few carrots and parsnips are coming in from Boston at \$3.25 for parsnips and \$3.00 for carrots. There seems to be few in the ground in this Province. Eggs are now 24 cents and are not very plentiful at that. A P. E. Island wire of last week quotes them at 23 cents Halifax, and not at all plentiful. The butter market is very strong in the Upper Provinces, but here it is very quiet and not much selling owing to continued high prices. There is very little local butter coming in. Rolls are quoted at 25 cents and creamery prints at 23 cents. It is very dull. They are quoting 1 1/4 l. o. b. Charlottetown for P. E. Island cheese.—Halifax Chronicle.

The outward cargo of the Minto yesterday consisted of 15 horses, 200 bags potatoes, 161 dressed hogs, 7 bbls meat, 24 qrs of beef, 84 cases eggs, and a large quantity of sundries. The Stanley arrived at 10 o'clock with the following: 50 passengers, 80 bags mail, 2 cars, Govern ment hay.

EVANGELIST Meikle, who has been holding revival services among the people of the Washademoak district N. B. has baptized many converts and altogether his sojourn in that section of Queens county has been fraught with large additions to the Baptist churches. Last week on one occasion he immersed thirteen young people in the river. A large hole was hewn out of the thick ice, but not cut through to the water except in one small place. Through this opening the tide flowed in, filling the improvised baptistry. A large congregation witnessed the ceremony, which was decidedly impressive.

It is expected that the board of trade will today discuss the question of winter communication with Prince Edward Island. Never was the requirement of a better transportation service between Prince Edward Island and the mainland more urgent than it is now. When one studies the effects of the unhappy isolation of that province during the last winter and this spring he is not surprised that the people of the Island make frequent complaint. The truth is that the people there have been singularly patient under the circumstances. Other Canadians desire to meet them and trade with them. The Prince Edward Island question is a Canadian question.—St. John Sun.

The Eleventh International Sunday School Convention is to be held this year at Toronto, June 23-27. Delegates are expected from all parts of America and Great Britain, and the attendance will be large. The program committee has been at work for some time and this meeting will be the best of the kind yet held. The usual rates are expected from the various railroads, and the delegates are to be entertained on the "Harvard System" that is, lodging and breakfast are provided and the delegates furnish their own meals for themselves at the hotels or restaurants near the place of meeting. Prince Edward Island is entitled to send eight delegates, who will be shortly appointed by the Executive Committee. It is hoped that the Island S. S. Association will be fully represented at this Convention. Anyone wishing fuller information as to the appointment of delegates, railroad fares etc. should correspond with the Field Secretary, Rev. A. D. Archibald, Summerside.

ALEXANDRA.—Owing to the extremely bad condition of the roads the mails have been very irregular lately.—The same thing has greatly hindered the hauling, especially of mussel mud, of which there has been none dug during the whole season.—Gunner Burhoe and several friends have spent some days on the ice. They report game scarce though they did not come home empty handed.—Lobster fishermen are in the midst of preparations for the opening season. The well known Gagner, John E. Jardine, has launched a splendid new boat of large size, the "King of the Turt." She is pronounced by Henry Burhoe and Geo. Judson, boat-builders of experience and ability, to be one of the finest yachts built here for many years. He is also nearing completion the "Piper," a boat of the same stamp for Pinette factory. This one promises to be nearly equal to the other. These are a great credit to the designer who, though so young, has already drafted and built boats which have shown their ability in Charlottetown regattas.—The school has had a large attendance through out the year, in spite of storms and bad roads. Only two days were lost during the winter.—The people are much pleased with the change in the Post Office, which is now in the centre of the district and very convenient for all.
