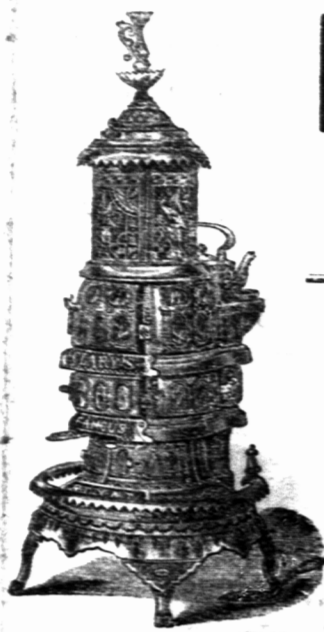

MORTE D'ALFRED

Tennyson's Glorious Death.

The New Poet Laureate—More Russian Cruelty to Canadians.

[SPECIAL TO GUARDIAN.]

LONDON, Oct. 6.—Tennyson died this morning at 1.35 o'clock, aged 84. His illness began Sept. 27th when he became chilled while driving and a cold resulting developed into influenza. Sir Andrew Clark, his physician, said his death was the most glorious he had ever witnessed, and came so quietly the watchers could scarcely distinguish the final moment. There was little suffering. The Pall Mall Gazette predicts that Gladstone will appoint Swinburne Poet Laureate in succession to Tennyson, and if so it will be a characteristic instance of the great man's magnanimity as Swinburne has repeatedly abused Gladstone.

(Lord Tennyson was born August 6th, 1809, one of twelve children of a poor country rector, Rev. George Clayton Tennyson of Somersley in Lincolnshire. Although descended by blood from the Plantagenet princes, he owes nothing to his aristocratic connections and was entirely a self-made man. He was educated at the country grammar school and later at Trinity College, Cambridge. He began writing poetry while in his teens. Carlyle described his appearance to Emerson thus: "One of the finest looking men in the world. A great shock of rough dusky dark hair; bright, laughing, hazel eyes; massive, aquiline face, most massive, yet most delicate; of sallow, brown complexion, almost Indian looking; clothes cynically loose, free and easy; smokes ignominiously tobacco. His voice is musical, metallic, fit for loud laughter and pleasing wail and all that may be between; speech and speculation free and plenteous; I do not meet in these late decades such company over a pipe."

In 1847 he made an expository happy marriage with Emily Sellwood, niece of Sir John Franklin, the great Arctic voyager, and in the same year the publication of In Memoriam raised him at one bound to the highest poetic fame. The death of Wordsworth having left the post of poet laureate vacant, the queen, on the recommendation of Lord John Russell, conferred it on Tennyson. It is rather curious now to note who the other candidates were: Leigh Hunt, Charles Mackay, Barry Cornwall, Robert Browning and Elizabeth Barrett, afterwards Mrs. Browning. All are dead, and not one of them ever approached Tennyson—only Browning.

In 1885 Tennyson went on a yachting tour with Mr. Gladstone to Denmark. Long before that Tennyson had refused a baronetcy and the Grand Cross of the Bath, but on their return from Denmark Mr. Gladstone prevailed on him to accept a peerage. He assumed the title of Baron Tennyson of Aldworth and Farringford.

More Russian Barbarism.

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 6.—Two sailors from the sealing schr. Maria seized by Russians, have arrived here. They escaped to tell a story of terrible sufferings. They say the Russians won't keep prisoners if they have to feed them. One sailor who tried to escape was shot dead. The Russians say they will seize every sealer found in Northern waters, and blow up or scuttle those which cannot be conveniently cared for.

A Unitarian Opinion.

MILWAUKEE, Oct 6.—The Unitarian conference has declared that the closing of the World's fair on Sunday would defeat the highest purposes of the Exhibition, the pleasure and education of the laboring men and women.

Bands of Marauding Negroes.

JACKSON, Miss., Oct. 6.—Six armed negroes visited two stores today, robbed them and killed the proprietors and also stole their horses and escaped. Bands of negroes are raiding Western Mississippi.

A Terrible Battle.

LAGUAGARA, Venezuela, Oct 6.—A terrible battle has taken place at Las-teques between the troops of Valencia and Caracas. Six hundred men, including many prominent officials were killed.

Steamer Wrecked in the St. Lawrence.

MONTREAL, Oct 6.—The steamer State of Georgia, is ashore in the River and will be a total wreck.

Found Drowned.

GLOUCESTER, Oct. 6.—Alex McMahar a Cape Breton fisherman was found drowned in the harbor this morning.

Report On Prince Co. Jail.

HON. W. W. SULLIVAN, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

YOUR LORDSHIP:

The Grand Jury of Prince County, now in session, acting under instructions given by your Lordship this forenoon, have held an inquiry as to the manner of the escape of the prisoner, Edward Callbeck.

Having made a close examination of the jail premises and lock of the front door, we find the lock of said door entirely useless. As a matter of fact several of the jurymen have unlocked the door with a table knife, which rendered it quite easy for any or all of the prisoners to escape.

The Jury also examined the lock on the south side of the jail yard gate, and found it practically useless, as they were unable to unlock it with the key, and that with the assistance of a machinist.

The fence on the north-east corner of the jail yard is, in our opinion, insecure, the opening between the fence and the building being such that an active prisoner might easily escape by climbing.

The Jury find considerable ashes and coal scattered about the yard.

The Jury find the rest of the jail premises in good order and regret that they cannot say as much in regard to the court room the walls of which are in a deplorable state.

The Jury are of opinion that the jailer should not allow the keys out of his custody as it appears that a machinist had access to them while working on the premises for years past.

We therefore recommend, first, that a new set of modern improved prison locks be placed on the jail doors, and that more stringent regulations be enforced by the proper authorities in reference to the custody and use of the keys.

Secondly, we recommend that the fence connecting with the building on the north-east corner be made secure by closing the aperture; and that the ashes and coal be cleared up in the jail yard.

We also recommend that the ceiling and walls of the court room be thoroughly cleaned and kalsomined.

The Grand Jury when in session having "to use one of the rooms occupied by the keeper, which is very inconvenient and disagreeable, would recommend that additional apartments be built for the keeper's use.

It being brought to the notice of the Jury that a slaughter house on the road between Summerside and St. Eleanor's, is a public nuisance—we strongly recommend that in view of the epidemic now raging in Europe and the prevalence of sick fever in this vicinity that the Board of Health be requested to take such steps as will remove all nuisances calculated to endanger the public health.

Germany's Big Laugh.

BERLIN, Oct. 4.—A man named Pfeiffer has been sentenced to six weeks' imprisonment for playing a practical joke. He sent an order to the Burgomaster of Hamburg to make a report to Casprivi of the last eclipse of the moon. It was written on an official letterhead of the Chancellor's office.

The Burgomaster, taking it seriously, with the aid of encyclopedias, his pastor, forester, brewer and a teacher, filled three pages of foolscap and sent it to Casprivi. The latter, thinking the Mayor insane, advised the authorities of Hamburg to make inquiries. Two policemen and an expert in lunacy were sent to the Mayor, and the joke was discovered.

A Sad New York Eviction.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—While a Deputy Sheriff was moving the effects of Mrs. Halpin, an aged invalid, into the street yesterday for non-payment rent, the woman, who was heart-broken expired kneeling in prayer.

Canadian Help for Ireland.

TORONTO, October 4.—A subscription list in response to Mr. Blake's appeal for Ireland, has been opened, and with four names upon it the total is \$5,000. F. B. Hayes, Ottawa, is down for \$2,000 and Messrs. George Kieley, Hugh Ryan and the Hon. Frank Smith for \$1,000 each.

A MISCARRIAGE.

Of Justice in Halifax.

Archbishop Vaughan's Tirade Against Protestantism as False Religion.

HALIFAX, Oct. 4.—All Halifax is talking about the miscarriage of justice in the case of the man Hartien, arrested for criminal assault upon little girls. He was alleged to have assaulted his children, and was committed upon three charges. He elected to be tried before County Judge Johnson and pleaded guilty. To the astonishment of everybody, the judge only sentenced him to twenty-one months in jail, while the general impression was that he should get a life sentence. The popular feeling has been so outraged that the attorney general feels it necessary to prepare information upon the other case and submit them to the grand jury now in session.

Judge Weatherbe of the supreme court, on the other hand, is a terror to criminals. In his address to the grand jury to-day he remarked that it used to be said that if there was any miscarriage of justice the court itself was thereby convicted, but he wanted the jury and the public to understand that should there be any miscarriage of justice now, that he, as the court, would not be open to condemnation. In the case of city assessor Ouelman, committed for fraud in connection with the assignment of one Gough, the scheme being for Gough to obtain all the goods he could on credit, to distribute them among Ouelman and others of a syndicate and then assign. Judge Weatherbe said it was a case, if proven, unprecedented in the history of the community. Ouelman desired to get Gough to go out west to get beyond the grasp of the victimized creditors. The jury must not pay any attention to the prisoner's position in the community. It should be treated the same as a poor criminal who steals a loaf of bread. They should not be exercised in the case of the person who holds an elevated position in preference to the degraded criminal.

Archbishop Vaughan's LETTER DENOUNCING PROTESTANTISM AS A "FALSE RELIGION," RAISES A STORM OF INDIGNATION IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, Oct. 4.—The letter written by the most Rev. William Vaughan, Catholic Archbishop of Westminster, in which he praises impartiality as shown in the election of Stuart Knill to the lord mayorship of London, but says a Catholic could not partake of the services of a false religion, has raised a tempest. The newspapers have printed many letters protesting against the statements of the archbishop, and declaring that unless Mr. Knill when he takes office as lord mayor, shows himself independent of Archbishop Vaughan, such bigotry will militate against a reputation in the future of such toleration as was shown in the election of a Catholic to the lord mayorship. One writer reminds the archbishop that the late Cardinal Manning's success in raising Catholics to their present position in England was due to his liberality of thought and true Christian feeling.

PERSONS using the Telephone would find talking much more satisfactory if they would observe the following Rules:

1st. Speak with your mouth about four inches from the transmitter.

2nd. Speak in a moderate tone of voice, not too loud, and distinctly.

3rd. Place the Telephone so as to cover the Ear, just as if you wished to shut out all other sounds. Do not press too hard on the Ear.

It is possible to talk and be heard when standing back two or three feet from the transmitter, if you shout loud enough, but it is not a pleasant mode of conversation, is entirely unnecessary, and is a useless waste of wind and lungs, besides being very annoying to all within range of your voice.
