Ott Sets New Mark For Runs Batted In As Giants Edge Chicago 4-3

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—Ott reached his coveted National League record for runs batted in today, but it was a homer by Willie Randolph in the 11th inning that earned New York a 4-3 victory over Chicago at the Victoria Park stadium.

Marshall drove a fly into the rightfield seats in the 11th to win for Lefty Melton, who had allowed only six hits, three of them in the second inning when the Cubs scored twice against three pitchers.

The Giants scored single runs in the second, third and eighth innings and it was a long fly by Ott that brought in the winning run.

War Dept. Has Say Whether Louis Fights

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Secretary Henry Stimson said today that "no one outside of the War Department" is in a position to make any commitments on requests that Joe Louis be permitted to fight for his own profit as world heavyweight champion.

Stimson told a press conference yesterday he was not prepared to say whether Louis would be permitted to fight for other purposes than the army's.

Mike Jacobs, who has promoted most of Louis' professional appearances, urged last week that the champion, now Capt. Joe Louis Barrow, be permitted to make one more professional appearance in order to meet a June 15 income tax payment of \$117,000.

Edgar Smith Suffers Ninth Y. M. C. A. 11 Defeat As Yanks Score 8-2 Victory Over Chisox

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—Unlucky Edgar Smith, who has not been able to win a game all season, suffered his ninth setback today as New York Yankees clustered eight runs in the second inning for an 8-2 American League triumph over Chicago White Sox.

Hank Borowy allowed eight hits, one less than the Yanks totalled, but kept the Sox scoreless except for a run in the sixth and another in the ninth. It was the eighth defeat the Yanks have handed Chicago in eight games this year.

Philadelphia A's may lose Star rookies

PHILADELPHIA, June 4 (AP)—Conn Mack, already harder hit by the army draft than any other manager in the major leagues, received the news today that he may lose two rookie wonder boys.

Center Jim Castiglia and shortstop Jack Wallace, greenhorns who became sensations with the Athletics overnight, both are being drafted for army service.

Mack was frankly worried, but patriot Mack was pleased.

"I will leave quite a hole in the team if they both join up," Mack said, "but it'll be hard on the enemy if they do as well in the army as they did for me."

Castiglia, who tried out this spring as a mental battling practice catcher and wound up with a contract and a .387 batting average, disclosed last night he has made arrangements to join the army and expects to be inducted within a few days.

Wallace, who started out as the scrappy laughing stock of the A's and then heard Mack call him "the Christian of the American League," said today his draft board has called him for a new physical examination June 13.

Landis Rules Out Commercial Exhibition Games

CHICAGO, June 4 (AP)—Kenesaw Mountain Landis, Commissioner of baseball, cracked down today on the commercial promotion of exhibition games that may interfere with the remaining series of major league contests devoted to Army and Navy Relief.

In a memorandum to major and minor league club presidents, Landis ordered them not to allow the use of their parks, players or facilities to promoters of games "allegedly played for relief, but actually as commercial enterprises." He also advised that Army and Navy authorities will refuse to grant furloughs to players now in the armed service to participate in games for commercial purposes.

INVASION DOORSTEP

This was the second Commando stab into the Boulogne area in six weeks and the R. A. F. has battered the region daily.

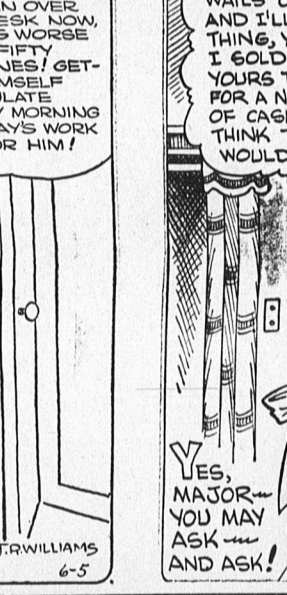

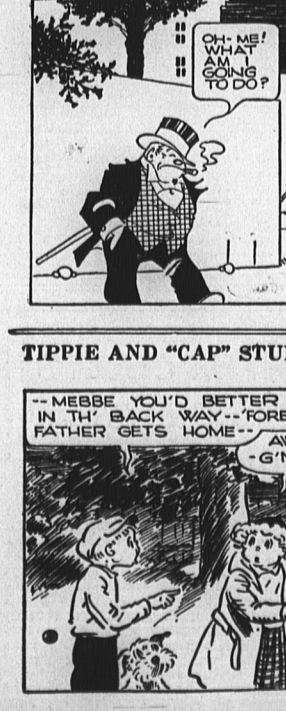
