EMIGRATION.— Several communications from England have recently been addressed to the Publicity Agent in regard to emigration to Canada, and one from a Mr. Harrison Watson states that he has a letter from the Belfast office of the Canadian Company requesting further particulars touching emigration to Prince Edward Island. The information sought has been forwarded.

BEAUTIFUL GOWNS.— The third session of the twelfth parliament of the Dominion which was opened by His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught was characterized by the beautiful gowns worn by the ladies. Among those present were Lady Davis, gowned in green satin brocade with pink trimmings in homiton lace, and Mrs. R. L. Borden, in a gown of American beauty chiffon velvet. The bodice and sleeves were of silver lace embroidered with pearls peplum of silver and pearls edged with sable, pearl ornaments. Princess Patricia wore a beautiful gown of powder blue chiffon, velvet, with a short tunic and dark blue tulle embroidered in silver. The Duchess of Connaught was regrettably absent.

PROFITABLE YEAR.— The annual meeting of the Shareholders of the Cornwall Creamery Company was held at the Cornwall Hall on Wednesday evening 21st, inst., at 2.30 o'clock. President Mr. J. Pope Crosby presided and the meeting was largely attended. The secretary read his report for the year, 1913 was the best in the history of the factory, the profits enabling the company to pay \$1.00 per hundred for milk received from the patrons. The total quantity of milk received was 692588, yielding on an average 3.75 per cent. butter fat. The total amount of butter fat was 39,834.84 lbs., while the quantity of milk required to make one pound of cheese was 10.5 lbs. The three patrons supplying the greatest quantity of milk were J. H. Murchison, Robt. Barrett and J. P. Crosby. The following are the Directors for the ensuing year: Messrs H. McMillan, W. W. Crosby, Donald Murchison, H. Drake, Jas. H. Drake and Wm. Doyle. On motion of Mr. McMillan, seconded by Mr. J. H. Drake, a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. J. P. Crosby retiring President, for his excellent work as head of the Company for the past year. On motion of Mr. Wm. Doyle, seconded by Mr. McMillan, a vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Hector Murchison for his efficient services as secretary of the Company.—W.

WEDDING BELLS.— The marriage took place at Tomkinsville, Staten Island, N. NEW MILITARY MOVEMENT.— There is at present on the Island Sgt. Hawkins, of the Royal Canadian Regiment, who has come from Halifax in connection with a new scheme of infantry training which the military authorities are introducing. Sgt. Hawkins will go over this province moving from the headquarters of one Company to another of the 82nd Regiment, conducting special schools of instruction in infantry, drill and tactics. At present he is in Pownall, the headquarters of B. Company, where he will hold this school of instruction one week. From there he will proceed to York, the headquarters of another Company where also for a week he will conduct the school. Thence he will move on until he will have completed his visits to the several headquarters of the regiment.

CANADIAN INVESTMENT CO.— A meeting of the contract holders of the Canadian Home Investment Company was held in the Board of Trade Rooms on Monday afternoon, when there was a large attendance. The meeting was addressed by Mr. W. F. Law, a director of the company and of the Alpha Investment Company, which has taken over the first-named concern, in regard to this transaction and the status of the contract holders in the new company. Mr. Law, with a fellow-director, Mr. B. Mack, is here for the purpose of giving a full explanation of the situation to the contract holders. At the contract holders of the C. H. I. C. company at \$10 apiece par, in which case they would be entitled to 6 per cent. interest when the plans matured. On the other hand, they could surrender their plans immediately if they desired, but only at a refund of 50 per cent. of their payments. There was a good deal of discussion on the matter and the opinion was expressed by one contract holder that contract holders could not do anything else than accept these terms, as the company held the whip hand over them; they must either accept shares in the new company at the prices dictated or lose a large portion of the money they had already paid in. It is understood that a large number of the contract holders have already taken up shares in the new company under the proposed terms.

VETERINARY REPORT.— The report of the veterinary director general for the year 1913 has been received. By it is shown that P. E. Island has been wonderfully free of disease as far as cattle, hogs, sheep, pigs and all farm animals are concerned. One horse was examined in the Island and found healthy. There was no report of diseased cattle or other animals. 12,159 horses were examined, one of which was for Charlottetown, and allowed to proceed to their destination. Four horses from the United States to Canada were allowed to enter after inspection from United States and Newfoundland ports. Among the establishments under inspection during the year were those of Davis & Fraser, by A. C. Lundie, V. S., W. A. Leard, Charlottetown and W. A. Leard, Summerside, the P. E. I. Myrick & Co., Tignish, J. P. Tanton & Co., Summerside, J. McNutt & Son, Malpeque, John R. Doucette, Waterford, Douglas Fraser, Peter's Road, Fred Bennett, Stanley Bridge, P. C. Gallant, Summerside, Thomas Butler, John Munn and A. Bowles, Murray River. The inspection was in charge of W. H. Pethick, V. S., Charlottetown.
