RIVERDALE-CHURCHILL WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

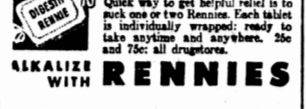

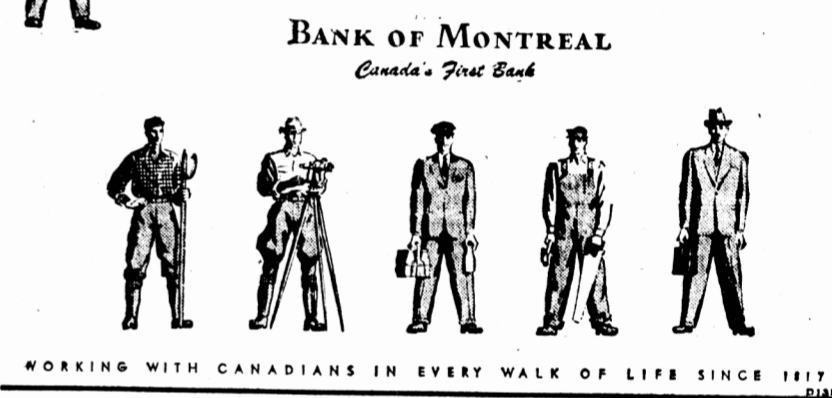
BROWN - MacEACHERN
