IN MEMORIAM

MRS. HUGH D. MACISAAC

The news of the sudden death of Mrs. Hugh D. MacIsaac of Bar Harbor, Maine, formerly Elizabeth Kelly of Stanchel, P. E. Island, came as a shock to all in her native parish of Kelly's Cross, P. E. Island where she was married in St. Joseph's Church, seventeen years ago by Rev. Thomas Curran, D. D., P. P. when her younger sister Margaret was united in marriage at the same time to Mr. Wilfred Woods, at present C. N. R. agent at Port Hill.

She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Percy Kelly of Stanchel and had a large circle of friends in her native place and in the parish of Kelly's Cross. In recording her tragic death which occurred after a few moments illness on Wednesday morning, December 7th, 1932, we chronicle the death of one who was universally beloved by all her friends in her native province and at the same time we note the passing of a good and esteemed citizen in the land of her adoption.

After completing a two years course in Union Commercial College, Charlottetown, she went to Bar Harbor, Maine, where she was employed as bookkeeper for her brother Percy Kelly for a period of nine years previous to her marriage, since which time she has resided there.

Besides her husband and five children she leaves to mourn the loss of an amiable sister, wife and mother, three sisters, Mrs. Edward Gallagher, Philadelphia, Mrs. Charles Woods, Kelly's Cross; Mrs. Wilfred Woods, Port Hill, P. E. I. four brothers, John F. and Percy Kelly, Bar Harbor, Maine, Richard Kelly, Washington, John T. Kelly, Stanchel, P. E. I.

The funeral services were held in the Church of the Holy Redeemer, Bar Harbor, on Friday morning, Dec. 9th. The church was filled with friends and relatives including many outside the parish. The funeral party which gathered at the home of Mr. MacIsaac was a large one. The flowers included set pieces of roses or carnations or other beautiful blooms from the various church organizations, from the nurseries and others.

MRS. JOHN R. MURPHY

The death of Mrs. John R. Murphy which took place at her home in Shamrock on Wednesday, January 11th, removed one of the oldest and most highly respected persons, and another link connecting the past and the present has been severed. In her 84th year death came as a result of old age. Stricken about 15 years with blindness she never complained but continued about until two years ago she was taken seriously ill and although she never seemed to suffer much was confined to bed about three days before her death her family

We offer the condolence of the community and the sympathy of friends and relatives who could not be present at her funeral owing to bad roads, to Mr. Murphy and family in the loss of their good wife and mother. To spend over fifty years in one community is an event in our times; and when that period of time is devoted to good work it is a memory that should not be forgotten, because, unless those early Catholics were valiant and true our boast of half a century Catholicity would be a confession of early beginnings, but little co-operation to keep faith in God and His Church alive. If one were to single out some details in Mrs. Murphy's life, it would be her simplicity. That simplicity was exhibited by her trust in God, in her disregard of the best things of life, in her devotion to home and her religion, and in her love for the green, glittering hills of Ireland, because her own Irish sires in spite of rick torture, scourging, fire and sword never let the flames of St. Patrick's faith die out. Let us then earnestly pray that Christ may have mercy upon her poor soul.

Opposed To Inflation Of Can. Currency

HALIFAX, Jan. 24.—Inflation of Canadian currency would not be of practical value, in the opinion of S. J. Moore, president of the Bank of Nova Scotia, who is here for the 101st annual meeting of the directors. He opposed the suggestion that the Canadian dollar be depreciated to place it on parity with the pound sterling. Any benefits that might accrue, he said, would be offset by the disadvantages.

The annual meeting of the directors will be held tomorrow. Mr. Moore is accompanied by J. A. McLeod, general manager. Hon. W. D. Ross, of Toronto, former Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, Hon. George Gordon, of North Bay, Ontario, and Frank Starr, of Saint John, directors.
