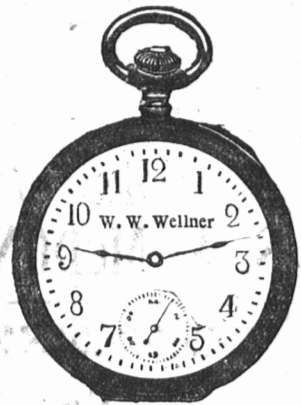

A BOSTON exchange has the following of an Island man:—No one in the list of hotel clerks employed in Boston is held in higher esteem than P. M.
