### OTTAWA NURSE FATALLY HURT.

OTTAWA, Oct 24—Minnie Corrigan, of Shawville, a nurse in training at St Luke's Hospital, Ottawa, was injured, probably fatally, by falling down an elevator shaft in the hospital Saturday night. She, with another nurse and a patient, were on the elevator, which passed three feet beyond the floor at which they were to get off, and stuck. The door was opened and a chair placed on the floor to enable them to step out. When Miss Corrigan stepped on the chair it tipped and, in falling, precipitated her beneath the elevator cage and to the bottom of the shaft, twenty-five feet down. Her skull was fractured, and one of her legs was broken. She is not expected to live.

### SUFFRAGETTE LEADER

IN NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Oct 24—Mrs Emmeline Pankhurst, founder and chairman of the Women's Social and Political Union of England, militant leader of the Women's Social and Political Union of England, militant leader of thousands of her sex whose battle cry for the House of Commons has been "votes for women," arrived on the Oceanic, of the White Star line, on her first visit to this country.

A delegation composed of prominent leaders in the women's suffrage movement here met her at the pier and later there was a reception at the Women's University Club, in Madison square.

If the hosts of men are trembling in fear that this spare, brown haired woman will marshal forces under her banner here and storm halls of legislation they need not worry, for at Quarantine she said she was coming here first to lecture and tell of her experiences and the cause in England and also to learn all she could about the women emancipation movement here.

"I can't tell you what is needed here," she said. "The American women must work out their own salvation. It is my first visit and it is for me to learn what is needed here rather than suggest. The conditions are far different, I understand, and because of the various States with varied laws on the rights of women."

### MORE ATROCITIES

IN CONGO STATE.

BRUSSELS, Oct 24—New atrocities in the Congo Independent State have been revealed by the officer of a rubber company. He charges that between 1907 and 1909 a number of the company's agents tortured and killed many natives, posted armed sentries, chained and imprisoned the natives to force them to work, and burned villages. The minister of the colonies has ordered an inquiry.
