"NATIONALS" AND THE ALBANY "ST. PATS"

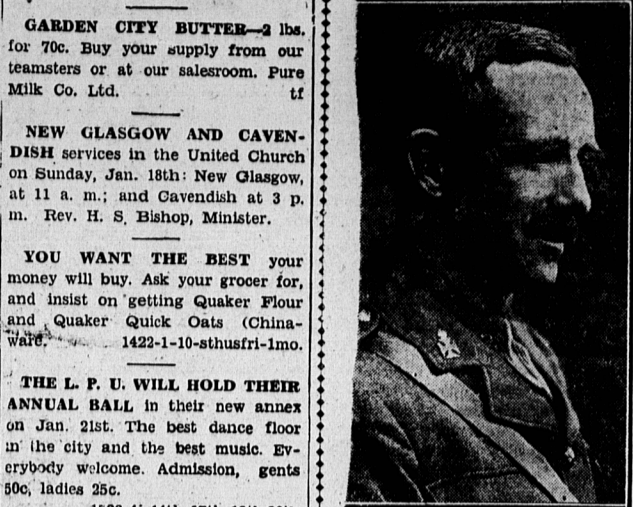

In the second period, the play was very even, Don MacPherson and Bud Howard made several brilliant end-to-end rushes, only to be stopped by "Handy Andy" the "St. Pats" stalwart goalie. The period ending without any score for either team.

The third period was fast and furious and the fans went frantic with "Rory" MacLeod in a sole rush tallied the first goal for the "St. Pats." Then Oscar Campbell and Legrie McAleer playing some very fast combination, skated through the "St. Pats" defense and "Handy Andy" very neatly stopped McAleer's sizzling shot, but Paquet skated in fast for the rebound and tallied the final score of the game for the "Nationals", the game ending three to one in the "Nationals" favor. — By "Empty."

LONDON, Jan. 15.—(By The Canadian Press)—The Marquis of Crewe has offered to give Crewe Hall for the use of the Cheshire County Council as central offices. The value of the gift is estimated at about \$1,250,000. The original Crewe Hall was one of the finest specimens of Elizabethan architecture in Cheshire. It was destroyed by fire in 1886, but upon reconstruction the plans of the original building were adhered to. Most of the rooms are wainscoted in carved oak. Lord and Lady Crewe have not resided at Crewe Hall for many years. They entertained the King and Queen there in 1913.
