Ottawa Star In Surprise Victory Over Jamaican

George LeClerc Eliminates Dayes From Singles As Starry Field Enters Quarter Finals Of Ontario Tennis Championships.

(By Elmer Dulmage, Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, July 18.—A fighting coterie of starry performers stormed the title gates at the Ontario tennis championships today and one, blonde George LeClerc of Ottawa, by no means an outsider anyway, crashed through to the men's singles quarter-finals in company with the best Eastern Canadian field assembled this season.

Leclerc, good enough to be invited to try out for Canada's Davis Cup team last spring, sprang a surprise triumph over Harry Dayes of Jamaica. It was by way of being sweet revenge, for the black-haired Jamaican, who wears a cricket cap on the courts, ousted Leclerc from the Eastern Canadian tournament last week at Ottawa.

After dropping the first set 5-7, Leclerc went to work and pounded out victory as 6-1, 8-6. Qualifying to play the dynamic little French-Canadian ace, Marcel Rainville of Montreal, in tomorrow's quarter-finals. The Ottawa won because his baseline play was steeper but mostly because his overhead shots from mid-court and at the net were unplayable. He scored frequent placements by rushing to the net behind his strong service.

Dayes' Teammate Whips Wilson... Dayes' dusky partner from Jamaica, Donald Leahong, thrilled a feature court gallery as he whipped the hard hitting Ross Wilson of Toronto with ease by scores of 7-5, 6-1. The slender youth from Jamaica outdistanced Wilson after the first set, volleyed brilliantly and was always in command after rallying to save the opening set.

The ranking stars of the east pulled into the "eights" beside Leclerc and Leahong, packing the brackets with more high class matches than any Ontario title tournament has seen. Walter Martin of Toronto, defending champion, had reached this stage yesterday.

Veteran Hurler Stops Cub Rally As Giants Capture Deciding Game Of Series

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 18.—The world champion Giants ganged on their closest rivals, Chicago Cubs, in one big inning here today and closed out a "crucial" five game series with an 8-6 victory that pushed the Cubs three games back in second place.

The Giants teed off on the "Mississippi Cat," Guy Bush, and his successor, Charlie Root, for six runs in the third inning, providing just enough ballast for ancient Dolf Luque to stagger through to victory after Freddy Fitzsimmons traded in the midst of a four-run Cub rally in the seventh.

The Cubs, fighting for the odd game that would have cut the Giants lead to a single game, were full of trouble and danger all the way. In the seventh, successive singles by Charley G. Stan Hack and Bill Herman, a walk to English and hCueck Klein's single brought Luque in with three runs across. Floyd Herman belted over the fourth with a single to centre, but the ancient Cuban stemmed the uprising there.

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
