"Underground" Begins Run At Prince Edward Today

Today's opening at the Prince Edward Theatre is "Underground," a powerful and exciting drama of the underground movement which is leading the fight for freedom in the oppressed nations of the world.

News of such activity has been carefully suppressed, but gradually word is coming to America that oppressed people in the world today are not taking their lot lying down. Such commentators as Eric Sevareid have affirmed that widespread sabotage and general revolutionary activity are developing in momentum in today's dictatorships.

This is a vast, vigorous and vital subject, life with drama and Warner's astutely took full advantage of its possibilities. A well-written story by the more exciting because the audience would know that such stories are really happening in the world today.

**BRITISH OFFICIALS LEAVE PROVINCE**—Captain H. H. Balfour, London, member of the British House of Commons and Under-Secretary for the Colonies, accompanied by Capt. W. W. Wakefield, London, also of the Air Ministry, and Air Vice Marshal Dalziel McKean, Ottawa, took off from the Charlottetown Airport early yesterday morning after a short visit here. Capt. Balfour, who arrived here from the British Isles about two weeks ago in connection with air training matters of the Royal Air Force, inspected No. 31 General Reconnaissance School, R.A.F., Monday evening. **CHERRY OLIVES** Wash the cherries and leave the stems on them. Any cherries from which the stems have become detached, should not be used. Pack the washed cherries into sterilized quart jars and then sprinkle over them 3 tablespoons sugar and 1 tablespoon salt. Now pour 1 cup of cider or white vinegar into each quart jar and homes jar to over-flowing with water. Seal the jars completely at once and allow the cherries to stand for several weeks before using them.

vade French Indo-China and the German radio said that in the event of such an invasion "measures would be taken immediately."

Military observers in Shanghai said they were skeptical of the origin of the Japanese report which was datelined Hong Kong. They suggested that there might be a similarity between the report and German accusations of British intentions before the invasions of Scandinavia and the Low Countries.

In Vichy, the capital of unoccupied France, authorized sources declared negotiations in Indo-China were under way between France and Japan. This developed as the pro-German newspaper Les Nouveaux Temps was saying France was in critical danger of losing Indo-China unless it worked with Japan for its protection.

A Japanese army spokesman in Shanghai acknowledged that Japanese reservists living in China had been called for duty, but he said the move was merely for training.

A British broadcast heard in New York said reports of large scale mobilization throughout Japan and requisitioning of horses and motor trucks indicated "big developments are imminent."

In London an authorized British source said reports that Japan was making demands on Indo-China were disturbing, noting that assurances given Britain last month that Japan had no territorial demands on Indo-China were rendered by Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka, who since has been removed from the government.

British sources in Singapore, expressing surprise over Japanese reports that British forces were preparing to invade Indo-China, said the reports "possibly are being circulated to pave the way for Japanese action."

"An attempt may be made to justify Japanese demands on Indo-China by the bogey of British intervention," these sources said.

## Near drowning At Montague

A near drowning accident occurred in Montague yesterday, when Ralph Mellish, who is about 12 years of age, accidentally fell over a bicycle he was holding at the time.

Being unable to swim, the boy began shouting for help. A man, who was one of the crew of a vessel unloading nearby, hastily lowered a boat and rescued him.

The bicyclist, believed to be Edward Outhouse who was standing alongside him. It was also fished out of the water.

Ralph is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Mellish. His father is a member of the Royal Canadian Air Force and is stationed at Summerside.

The accident occurred while Corporal L. B. Mellish, his grandfather, was at West St. Peter's investigating a drowning.

## Col. Raiston Visits Ch,town

Colonel, the Honourable J. L. Raiston, Ottawa, Minister of National Defence, paid a short visit to Charlottetown yesterday afternoon. He arrived in the province Monday from Halifax, N. S., on an informal visit.

While in Summerside he visited a detachment of the Veteran's Guard of Canada.

Monday night he was a guest of Premier Campbell in the latter's summer home at Stanley and after his visit to Charlottetown yesterday returned there last night. He will visit Summerside today before leaving for the mainland. He will be joined at Summerside by Major-General W. H. P. Elkins, G. O. C. Atlantic Command.

Colonel Raiston was accompanied to the Province by two Press Liaison officers, Lieut. W. E. Austin, Military District Headquarters Ottawa, and Lieut. E. L. Williams, Military District No. 6, Halifax. His Secretary, Mr. James Wells had come to the Island before him.

He arrived in Charlottetown about 4:20 p. m. yesterday and accompanied by Premier Campbell, Major J. R. Paton, Lieut. Austin, Lieut. Williams and Mr. Wells, proceeded to No. 62 Canadian Army Basic Training School at Beach Grove where he was met by Lt. Col. F. Andrew, M. C. Officer Commanding and Brigadier C. E. Connolly, Officer Commanding Military District No. 6. There he saw about 280 men going through routine drill and a unit of the Veteran's Guard of Canada. Col. Raiston, in a few remarks to the troops congratulated them on their fine showing and told them that he was not optimistic over the prospects of a short war. He complimented the officers on the fine job they are doing in training the soldiers. His visit ended about 6:30 p. m. when he was given three cheers by the troops before leaving.

From Beach Grove he went to the Ordnance Compting and after a short inspection visit to the camp of the Veteran's Guard of Canada. Here the Minister of National Defence witnessed the veterans going through arms drill.

In a short address, he reminded the veterans that they were part of the 7000 World War men on service in Canada now. He pointed out that they had been doing before coming here and was informed that they had been on duty at an internment camp on the island. He also congratulated the veterans on their fine appearance.

## PORK PRODUCTS

Mr. Gardiner's announcement said the British ministry of food had requested that shipments of bacon under the present United Kingdom agreement be speeded up so that, if possible the present contract for 425,000,000 pounds of bacon, hams and other cuts be completed by about Sept. 15 instead of Oct. 31 as originally scheduled.

"The increased rate of shipment necessary to comply with this request will require that every hog marketed in Canada during the next two months be available for export to the United Kingdom or for distribution in the domestic market," Mr. Gardiner said.

"On the completion of the present agreement for 425,000,000 pounds of bacon, hams and other cuts on Sept. 15, 1941, it is anticipated that the agreement for the following 12 months will call for the delivery by Canada of 600,000,000 pounds of bacon, ham and other cuts.

"The larger order will necessitate a substantial increase in the Canadian production of hogs."

Mr. Gardiner said that recently the bacon board received information that it was of the "utmost importance that regular weekly shipments as provided for in the present (bacon) agreement be maintained, otherwise the British Ministry of Food would find difficulty in maintaining a ration of four ounces per week per person to the people of the British Isles."
