LOCAL BRIEFS

Latest News of the City and Province.

LEAGUE of the Cross picnic to-day.

The Saturday Bulletin of July 28th, published in New Glasgow, N. S. says: Ira J. Yeo, Esq., of Charlottetown, is visiting friends in the city.

THE freights on hard coal have gone up, and in the United States this coal has had quite an advance; that means a decided increase in price for those using this coal in these Provinces.—Pictou Advocate.

Two hundred pounds of milk are sent daily from Antigonish to Sydney and North Sydney, each town taking one hundred pounds. Twelve cans are also sent every day from Stewiacke to Sydney.—Pictou Advocate.

ON Saturday Mr. Purdy with a number of men were engaged in taking the bulge out of the eastern end of the Provincial building. It is understood that the wall has been driven in over two inches. Iron rods have been placed and it is hoped that before it is finished the building will be righted.

HUMAN sympathies are keen and the appearance of physical anguish at all times calls for compassion. The observer will wish that he had none when beholding the citizens at Victoria Park on Sunday afternoons. The heated atmosphere drives the citizens to a cool retreat and when people assemble at the Park sufficient seats should be provided for those who desire to rest a weary body.

SATURDAY afternoon Mr. J. C. McDonald commenced the preparing of pasteurized milk. A large number witnessed the machine in operation. Hundreds of samples were sent out and delivered by the beautiful delivery waggon of the company. It is interesting to see how the milk is prepared and Mr. McDonald is only too happy to explain the process. The cleansing of the bottles by being first immersed in a solution of soda and afterwards in tepid water insures entire cleanliness. The interior of the bottles are washed with a revolving brush driven by a belt. The operator fills the bottle and by a little pressure the brush is inserted and in an instant the bottle is cleaned. The filling of the bottles is another interesting study. By the pressing of a lever the bottles are filled. Mr. McDonald furnishes each of his patrons with coupons. \$1.00 will buy a sheet which contains twenty coupons. Each customer when he returns his bottle places a coupon in it. A description of the prepared milk and cream appeared in THE GUARDIAN some days ago and as Mr. McDonald has published a neat prospectus covering much of the ground it is not necessary to refer again to it. Suffice it to say the dairy is fitted up in a first class manner and equipped with the latest machinery for the preparation of an article freed from germs, which will cost the consumer the same price as milk purchased in its usual state.

Fortunately Mr. Hutchison was able to secure the boys names. During Friday night, burglars again entered the store in the same manner and took some money and a quantity of nuts, candy, etc.

Prof. Thurlow and Messrs. G. Oak, Chas Smith, and A. J. Small left by the Duchesse Wednesday morning for their homes in Newburyport Mass. For the past week or ten days they have been enjoying the scenery and hospitality of the Island, which they consider a veritable paradise for the leisure or moneyed classes. They were more than delighted with their visit to the Province and think it rightly named the "Garden of Canada." While here they were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. (Dr) Henderson, Union Road, Lot 33.

DURING the past week many citizens have contracted severe colic by the changeable weather: A Boston journal in referring to the matter among other things says:—"Now the subject of summer attire for men is under discussion, some thoughtless persons are advocating a tropical costume for spells of tropical weather. It is not safe, unless a man carries a wrap around with him to put on when the wind unexpectedly changes to east in the middle of the afternoon."

THE body of Fredk. Burke, who was drowned near the Block House some time ago was found Saturday morning at Squaw Bay about a mile from Tea Hill, by Mr. Cullen. The body had evidently been floating about for some time. It was identified by Mr. Judson, the man for whom Burke worked, by the boots and jumper worn by the deceased. Dr. Conroy, coroner for Queen's County, after viewing the body decided that an inquest was not necessary.

DR. SAUNDERS well-known in this province as the Director of the Dominion Experimental farm is in Europe. He will be absent three months, during which time he will visit the Paris Exposition, to examine the horticultural exhibits as to their fitness for the Glasgow Exhibition next year. He will also represent Canada at the British Association meeting at Bradford, in September, and take the opportunity to visit experiment stations in Great Britain and France with which he has long been in correspondence since his appointment as director, but has not visited for fourteen years.

INDICATIONS are that Canada will turn the product of her dairy in another direction. An exchange says: "The Ontario Department of Agriculture is in receipt of a communication from England making enquiries as to whether any creameries have shipped cream instead of butter to England, or whether they are in a position to do so. The enquiry is made by a gentleman who supplies foreign material to English butter factories. If the Canadian cream could be laid down in good shape at the English factory the presumption is that it would there be made into good English butter. Whether such could be done, and whether it would pay to ship the cream rather than the butter, is a question that creamery men would have to carefully investigate. If any of our creamery proprietors are disposed to look into the question they might communicate with Mr. Harrison Watson, of the Imperial Institute, London, Eng., who will place them in communication with the English importer."

THAT the tourist traffic is not as large this year as last year is acknowledged. The wars, Presidential election and Paris Exposition, rush in manufacturing, etc., are attributed as the main reasons why the provinces are not receiving as large a number of tourists as usual. Many have written to friends on the Island and expressed regret that they are prohibited from breathing the beautiful balmy atmosphere of the Garden of the Gulf. The American citizens realize the appreciable difference between the air of P. E. Island and the oppressive heat in Uncle Sam's Union, where the thermometer jumps to an extreme that is almost unbearable. It is certainly a welcome change for those who leave those sweltering conditions behind them. Recently a citizen received a letter from a friend residing across the border and in it he states that the thermometer stood at 80 in the shade at 6 in the morning and in the evening it was 100°. However the indications are that attention to business at home will cause a serious diminution of the tourist traffic at least so far as P. E. Island is concerned.
