

**PLEBISCITE MEETING AT N. WILTSHIRE.**—A very successful meeting in the interests of the coming plebiscite was held in North Wiltshire Hall on Tuesday evening. Mr. Edilson Easter occupied the chair. **Pointers For 1923**  
NO. 2 GOVERNMENT HOUSE PROPERTY  
(BY W. L. COTTON)

Another matter that demands attention, and that ought to be dealt with this year, appertains to the Old Government House and the very disastrous condition of the property connected with it. If a mistake not, that property was conveyed, in trust, to the Lieutenant Governor of the Province (for the time being) for the purposes of a residence for the Lieutenant Governors in succession. That being so, the Lieutenant Governor for the time being cannot permit its diversion to other purposes, and least of all its sale to private individuals, and be true to his trust, unless, indeed, another eligible residence for his successors be provided.

No doubt the site of the Old Government house is one of the finest in the Province, and no doubt the money expended upon the property in the exigencies of the great war was worse than mis-spent. Yet it was mis-spent in one of the best causes and with the best intentions. Regret is consequently as needless as it is vain. The practical question is, what are we going to do about it now? To tear down the large erection attached to the Old Government House would cost much money and would involve the destruction of the buildings that are, and may continue to be useful to the public.

This being so, it has been suggested that the whole property might be let to the C. N. R. or some other company for the purpose of a summer hotel attractive to tourists than which no better site could be obtained—and that another suitable residence on some other eligible site should be provided for the Lieutenant Governors of the future. But, in the meantime, Mr. Sterna has supplied the splendid Beach Grove Inn, and it would not be fair to set up a competing summer hotel until it has been demonstrated that two such hotels could be successfully and profitably maintained.

Then the idea of a Provincial Museum in the Old Government House has been suggested, and the adaptation of the extraneous buildings for the purposes of an Agricultural School and technical College. This latter suggestion seems to be worthy of favourable consideration. A technical school adapted to the conditions and needs of this Agricultural Province has already been established on the premises, and may be further developed to meet the educational requirements of our youth. As to the proposed Museum, Prince Edward Island is far behind the other Provinces of Canada. A museum would be both instructive to the residents and interesting and attractive to strangers.

In any case the sale of that part of the Government House property which fronts on Brighton Road for private residences could not be permitted by the Lieutenant Governor. Nor would its sale for that purpose be advisable in the interests of the public. The money obtained for it would be sunk out of sight in the course of a year and the people at large would lose for all time the advantages in it which they may possess. Moreover the future years in which thousands of summer tourists may come to this province will need fields for recreation and will be borne in mind. Much more advisable than its sale in building lots would be the extension of Victoria Park to Government Pond and the gradual conversion of the Grand and Park in rear of Government House buildings into a desirable public resort for rest and games and other means of recreation.

If the Lieutenant Governor were provided with another residence suitable to his position and the social duties appertaining to his office and if he could then consistently with the trust imposed upon him, consent to the transfer of the Government House Property for the uses and advancement of the public in all the years to come, he would, I think, do that
