Coaling stations we ought to have; coaling stations we must have. Let us," said the count lightly as he lighted a fresh cigarette, "remember some time in the future our conversation of today. **Spelling "Chop suey."**

There are about as many ways of spelling "chop suey" as there are ways of preparing it, and scarcely half a dozen Chinese restaurants can be found in Chicago where the name of the dish is not misspelled, and yet none is absolutely correct. On South State street one sign reads "Chop Suey." On West Madison street is another which reads "Chop Soor." On Clark street, where there is a nest of Chinese restaurants, the name is spelled in many ways.

An educated Chinaman, speaking of this spelling or misspelling the other day, said:

"All the ways are right, and all are wrong. It is only a guess at best. It would be impossible to spell the name rightly in English. The nearest approach to the correct spelling would be 'scholchop slouey.' This could not be pronounced by an American, so we have come to use 'chop suey' as the proper way of painting our signs. Yet the other ways are not incorrect."—Chicago Inter Ocean.

**Jena or Sedan?**

The current sensation in military Germany is Adam Beyerlehn's "Jena oder Sedan?" It purports to show that the method of drills, parades and other tactics now used in the German army is antiquated and is rapidly destroying that most important element in modern warfare, individual initiative, and is creating mere human machines which refuse to work as soon as they are removed from control of officers' authority. The book is in the form of a novel, and the author graphically describes the monotonous life in the barracks, the wearisome and dulling drills, the showy parades and the hardships of the maneuver fields. He describes the petty tyranny of the non-commissioned officers and of the commissioned officers of the lower grades and asserts that the most patriotic officer, the one keenest in his profession, must sooner or later abandon himself to monotonous routine. He asks whether the army is going, to Jena or Sedan.

**The Pata Morgana.**

This beautiful atmospheric phenomenon, which takes its name from one of the fairies of mediæval legend and is specially prevalent at the strait of Messina, between Italy and Sicily, has lately been critically studied by Dr. Boccardi of the technical college at Reggio. He has seen the apparitions under three different forms—airial, marine and multiple. In the first case buildings on the Italian coast were seen projected on the Sicilian coast beyond. In the second case arches on a railway above Messina were visible, magnified and more brilliant than the real arches, standing below the sea line with no apparent support. In the multiple Morgana aerial and marine apparitions are visible simultaneously. All these appearances are ascribed to variations in atmospheric density, producing abnormal refraction.

**Diamond Fields.**

From seven diamonds, weighing from two to twenty-one carats, that have been picked up in Wisconsin and adjoining states Professor William H. Hobbs traces the diamond fields of the Canadian wilderness south of Hudson bay. The only known matrix of the diamond is the black shale, or "blue ground," around the necks of burned out volcanoes. The loose stones found seem to have been transported by glaciers, and on following up the probable courses of these ancient ice rivers the lines converge in the barren territory stated.
