MARINE EXAMINATION.—The numerous friends throughout the Province of Captain Frank Peter Gallant, acting master of the C. G. S. "Brant," are congratulating the popular captain on having last week passed a highly creditable examination for Master of Passenger Steamship in the Coastwise Trade, before Captain Cameron, Examiner of Masters and Mates. Captain Gallant has many years been one of the island's most successful master mariners in sailing vessels, and for several years past has been in the Government supply and buoy service around the coasts and in Halifax. ANOTHER PUMP TEST.—A test of the new Gould's pump recently installed at the Supplementary Supply of the Charlottetown Water Works was made a few days ago. The capacity of the Fairbanks Company, tractors, The Fairbanks Company, had guaranteed a capacity of 850 gallons per minute against a total head of 30 feet. The consumption per hour exceeded eleven pounds per hour. COMPULSORY TRAINING FOR UNITED STATES

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Universal, compulsory military training legislation was formally launched today in the Senate when Senator Chamberlain, of Oregon, Chairman of the Military Committee, introduced the bill providing for the training of about 600,000 men of 20 years of age, and, in the President's discretion, many thousands more up to 23 years of age. The bill was referred to the committee.
