A PRACTICAL REVOLUTION

In the Generation of Steam is the Invention

Of F. S. Smith, a Charlottetown Man—Dr. E. P. Moore of this City is also Financially Interested in the Scheme.

The following from The Times of South Bend, Ind., will be read with great interest by many friends of those mentioned. F. S. Smith is a brother of Arthur Smith of Morris & Smith a half brother of Henry Smith clerk of the County Court and was formerly in the employ of the London House and later with G. H. Holbrook and removed from this city several years ago. Dr. E. P. Moore, Mr. Smith's brother-in-law is a son of Theophilus Moore of the Customs Department who is financially interested in the scheme.

What is pronounced by nearly a score of experts to be a revolution in the process of generating steam is now in successful operation at the Haberle & Graham machine shop. The invention is called an instantaneous steam generator and is the work of F. S. Smith of Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, a brother-in-law of Dr. E. P. Moore, of this city, who is financially interested therein.

The generator is primarily intended for use on automobiles, but can be used in creating steam power to any desired quantity, either in one machine or by working several machines in batteries. Mr. Smith has been employed as draughtsman for the Westervel company. The United States patent office has allowed all but two of 19 claims and the attorney handling it is confident of securing all. Patents are pending in Germany, France, Belgium and Canada.

The lightness and compactness of the generator makes it especially practicable for use in automobiles, but it may be used for large power engines, steam heating plants, bath and hot water heaters. Any kind of fuel may be used, but kerosene is preferable, as it is becoming the recognized fuel.

Another great advantage possessed by the invention is that it is absolutely non-explosive, even were steam generated to a pressure of 1000 pounds to the square inch.

The generator now being shown and operating an engine picked up haphazard is 14 inches long. Inside are a series of discs 14 inches in diameter which are to be constructed of copper, thus securing less weight than in the use of iron and steel. These discs can be punched out the same as pennies, which greatly cheapens the cost of construction.

The discs are parallel to each other in pairs. The more discs used the greater steam power can be generated. If one disc gets out of order it is only necessary to remove it, which can be readily done, leaving it out altogether, or replacing it with another. Disengagement may be readily accomplished by the least experienced person, making cleaning a simple process.

The speed of the engine, its starting and stopping, is controlled wholly by the water supply. The pump is so timed as to throw a spray of water into the generator which spreads like a fine film over the heated plate or disc, is converted into steam and then passes successively through the small holes in the series of discs, all the time becoming more powerful. This does away with the necessity for steam storage space, as the steam passes directly to the engine, no more being created than is necessary. In the model, 14 x 14 inches, there is contained by the disc arrangement 35 square feet of heating surface, which explains wherein the process of generating steam is revolutionized. This model will develop about 15 horse power. When the engine being made especially for the generator is completed it will be provided with a condenser that will enable using over the exhaust, thus saving 75 per cent of the water used. Operated at a speed of 1000 revolutions a minute, no noise was produced by the generator.

Made out of copper, an eight horse power generator will weigh about 125 pounds, which means a great saving in weight when used in connection with automobiles.

In the test cold water was used. A jet was pumped into the generator and in an instant was converted into steam. The inventor says that with the plates or discs and water cold, steam can be generated inside three minutes' time. In its use with automobiles a pilot lamp would be kept burning under the discs and when the water is turned on the lamps are automatically lighted. The pilot lamp also serves to keep the plates warmed while the engine is not in use. So soon as the water

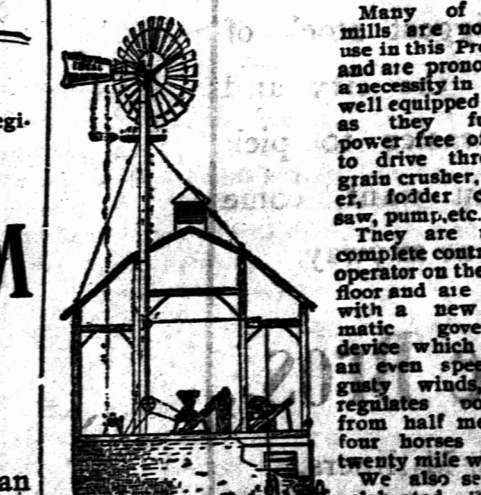
