### CLEARING THE SLUMS BY TENEMENT-SCHEME

LONDON, June 1.—The opening of two blocks of tenements at New Street, Aldgate, by the Lord Mayor, Sir Edward Kynaston Studd, recently marked the conclusion of a scheme of slum clearance in the neighbourhood of Middlesex street formulated 10 years ago by the corporation of London.

The scheme involved the demolition of 151 houses and the displacement of 885 persons, 250 of whom had to be rehoused on the area. Housing accommodation for 635 persons has been provided by the Corporation at its own expense by the erection of a block of dwellings known as Windsor House in Wenlock road and Shepherdess Walk, and to meet the need of rehousing the 250 persons on the area, it was decided, with the approval of the Ministry of Health, to erect two blocks of buildings on the most up-to-date lines, the designs for which were prepared by the City Engineer.

The two blocks which cost \$263,000, have been designed to contain 40 tenements, the weekly rental for each of which is about \$5.50.

The pens leading in total production are: 1st. Exp. Farm, Fredericton, N.B., Pen 6, 1393 eggs, 1514.6 points. 2nd. S. R. Pendleton, Kensington, P. E. I., 19, 1318 eggs, 1441.5 points. 3rd Mrs. J. H. McPhail, New Haven, pen 20, 1333 eggs, 1427.8 points. The total eggs laid for the week was 952, and to date 22886.

### THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., June 2 — Eggs receipts on the Montreal produce market were considerably improved for this week amounting to 19,855 cases which is nearly 10,000 cases better than last week. The total sales for last week show a complete recovery to usual totals for the period of the year. Butter receipts amounting to 7,712 boxes were also greater than those of the previous week. Cheese arrivals also showed an increase, the total being 22,905 boxes, for the week. Saturday's receipts for butter, eggs and cheese were as follows: butter, 2,521 boxes; eggs 3,940 cases; cheese 4,545 boxes. Wholesale butter prices were unchanged on Saturday. The market for eastern townships Number One pasteurized being general at 35 cents per pound. Improvement in trading was reported at the weeks' close. Retail prices were steady at 37 cents per pound for solids and 38 cents per pound prints. Cheese prices on the local market were better during the past week. No. 1 Ontario colored advanced to 18-14 cents per pound and Uo. 1 Quebec white and colored sold at 18 cents per pound. Eggs ruled steady throughout the week. Retail prices were as follows: fresh extras 35 cents per dozen; fresh firsts 32 cents per dozen, and fresh seconds 28 cents per dozen. The potato market was quiet, the hot weather reducing demand considerably. Prices were easier for New

BRUNSWICK potatoes during the week with Prince Edward Island prices steady. New Brunswick Green Mountains were sixty cents per ninety pounds, in bulk, on track in carlot bulk lots. Prince Edward Island potatoes were eighty cents for whites and 85 cents for Green Mountains per ninety pounds in bags.

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH  
The West Kent Cadets paraded in uniform to the morning service at Trinity. There was a large turnout and the boys presented a splendid appearance. They were welcomed by the Pastor, Rev. H. Johnson, who spoke from the text as found in Isaiah 32-12, "Behold a King shall reign in righteousness" and made special reference to King George whose birthday we commemorate today, paying an eloquent tribute to his many excellent qualities which have made him not only a National figure greatly beloved but an International and world character honored and esteemed by all peoples. The Monarchy under King George represents the ideal form of Democratic Government. In the second part of the text the speaker contrasted the conception of a man as held by the world from the earliest times down to the present a warrior, with the prophetic conception "And a man shall be as a hiding place from the wind, and a covert from the tempest, as rivers of water in a dry place, as the shadow of a great rock in a weary world." The boys were urged to catch the vision as presented by the Prophet Isaiah.

### Church Services

THE BAPTIST CHURCH  
Dr. A. C. Vincent, entered on his duties as minister of the Charlottetown Baptist Church with the services of yesterday. The audiences, morning and evening were large and attentive.  
The morning sermon "Jesus' standard of greatness" was based on Mark 10, 45, "For the Son of man also came not to be ministered unto, but to minister and to give his life, a ransom for many." The speaker referred to the many different conceptions of Jesus; that held by the Jewish people and indeed by his own disciples, of the Messiah who should materially govern and restore the glory of Israel, the idea of the Teacher who should bring to the world new truth, new ideas of God, The Prophet who might unveil the unseen, the Impostor, and finally the Example whose life and ideals we should follow and attempt to reproduce. In these days there is the danger that we shall regard Him of whom the Almighty said "This is my beloved son" as an example and only an example.  
Messiah, Teacher, Prophet, Example, Jesus is all of these and more. Jesus, Son of Man and Son of God, saw man as he was, in his weakness, his needs, his futile search for happiness; Jesus seeing the need, had burning within his great heart the vision of "the Father's business" "the Son of Man came not to be ministered unto but to minister." Impelled by this mighty ideal, he followed it even unto the end, and he asks his people now to follow him and like him to minister—to serve. The mark of our devotion is in the answer to the query "Do we desire, above all else, to serve?"  
"A Preacher Unashamed" was the subject of the evening sermon. The text, Rom. 1-16, "For I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ."  
What was Paul's Gospel? It was the supernatural gospel, and the gospel of fact. Science has no right to be dogmatic—it deals with theories—and abstracts—The Church has a right to be dogmatic. It is dealing with facts. Paul preached the gospel of the Cross, the gospel of the empty tomb, the risen Lord. The blood of Jesus Christ cleanseth us from all sin.  
I am not ashamed. Surrounded by Roman power—faced with keenest philippicisms, with pride in his conviction, he said "I am not ashamed."  
The Gospel of Jesus Christ is a gospel of a glorious achievement—Let our lives express our pride and glad confidence. It is a power.  
No power in this world today so great as the power of the Cross. It is the only power that will bring peace, personal peace, civic peace, international peace.  
POWER UNTO SALVATION.  
Therein is the purpose of the Gospel. The power is there available to all. The way to its mighty working and the only way is the way of acceptance—through giving your heart to God.  
The limitless power may be yours—will you through Christ, connect your life with God, and let that power flow through, and express itself in your life.  
The music of the evening service was particularly worshipful and impressive. A particularly fine rendering of "Hark, Hark My Son" was rendered with Mrs. Henderson very expressively taking the contralto solo. Miss Barbara McNeill's soprano rendering of "I will extol Thee O Lord" was notably fine. Miss McNeill and Mr. Quigley very effectively took the solos in the opening anthem "Praise the Lord Ye Heavens adore Him?"
