HUNS IN FULL FLIGHT

France Will Soon Be Cleared of Invaders.

Hammer Blows Delivered by Allies Compel Retreat on 206-mile Front—Many Villages and Much Material Captured in the Big Advance—Enemy is Retiring From Douai and Other Strong Points of Defence.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—North of the Scarpe river, in the direction of Douai, the British have passed the Drocourt-Queant line and reached the Lens-Douai Railway in the vicinity of Beaumont, and at Quiry-la-Motte, farther north, have arrived at Henin-Lietard, on the Douai-Carvin road. The enemy evidently is retreating from Douai.

The British have captured St. Aubert, and thus are within seven miles of the main German lateral line of communications, namely, the Valenciennes-Lille Railway.

The enemy is retreating on the whole front from the Soissons-Laon road to Grand Pré, north of the Argonne Forest, and also from the north bank of the Sappe river in Champagne. Gen. Gouraud's army in Champagne advanced four miles yesterday and captured Machault. The enemy is falling back toward Vouziers. Gouraud was closely pursuing the enemy in retreat over nearly the entire front of his army west of the Aisne toward the line of the Sappe. He occupied Brières, east of the Vouziers railroad line, and north of Grand Pré gap took Corbon, Mont St. Martin and Semilly, on the Vouziers-Chatelet railroad line.

The German troops still resisting on the line of the Sappe are in another dangerous pocket.

The rapid advance of Gen. Debeney's forces in close pursuit of the retreating enemy has brought them to the Oise in the region of Bernaville, where they are meeting with strong resistance from infantry and machine guns.

Gen. Mangin's troops, after encountering lively opposition, have reached the Chemin-des-Dames in the region of Courtecon, and have crossed the Ailette at Grandpont. Chivy has also been taken.

Cavalry joined in the pursuit of the Germans. Gen. Gouraud's army yesterday, being the first to enter Lanuville. The advance on the eastern part of the battlefield was much accelerated, the French and American troops at some points gaining about seven miles. The Americans, notwithstanding a heavy bombardment of the region with mustard gas shells, took Machault.

Gen. Gouraud's troops advanced to the River Retourne over most of its length and took Savigny-sur-Aisne, only two and a half miles south of Vouziers, which is in flames. Guise and all of the villages south of Laon are in flames.

This means that the Germans are in full retreat along a front of at least two hundred miles, from Douai, near the Belgian frontier, to the eastern border of the Argonne Forest, near the Meuse.

The Havas Agency says: "The victory in the Cambrai region increases daily in magnitude, producing indirect repercussions over the whole front. The wedge driven into the German lines to a depth of 20 kilometers in five days menaces the Douai-Laon massif. The Germans are in general retreat from north of Cambrai to Verdun. In consequence of the extremely rapid advance of the Franco-British troops, who have reached the open ground between the Oise and the Sennese, the situation of the German centre becomes extremely critical, the more so because Gen. Gouraud's continued progress west of the Argonne menaces the enemy's left wing.

"The enemy front on the Chemin-des-Dames and the Aisne, under the assaults of Gen. Mangin's forces and the army operating northwest of Rheims, was shaken despite energetic resistance, the enemy intending at all costs to protect the retreat of his forces delayed on the Aisne. The enemy was obliged to abandon enormous booty in the Argonne."

The cleaning up of the Argonne Forest has been completed by the American troops. No Germans now remain in that great wooded area.

The Germans will have to evacuate the St. Gobain Forest almost immediately.

The Germans are evacuating positions they still held in the Chemin-des-Dames under the pressure of the converging attacks west and south of it.

Transport Was Sunk.

A British Port, Oct. 12.—A large number of American troops have been lost as the result of the sinking of the transport Otranto in the north channel between the Scottish and Irish coasts in a collision with the steamer Kashmir.

The Otranto after the collision was dashed to pieces on the rocks off the south Scottish coast with a probable loss of 372 American soldiers.

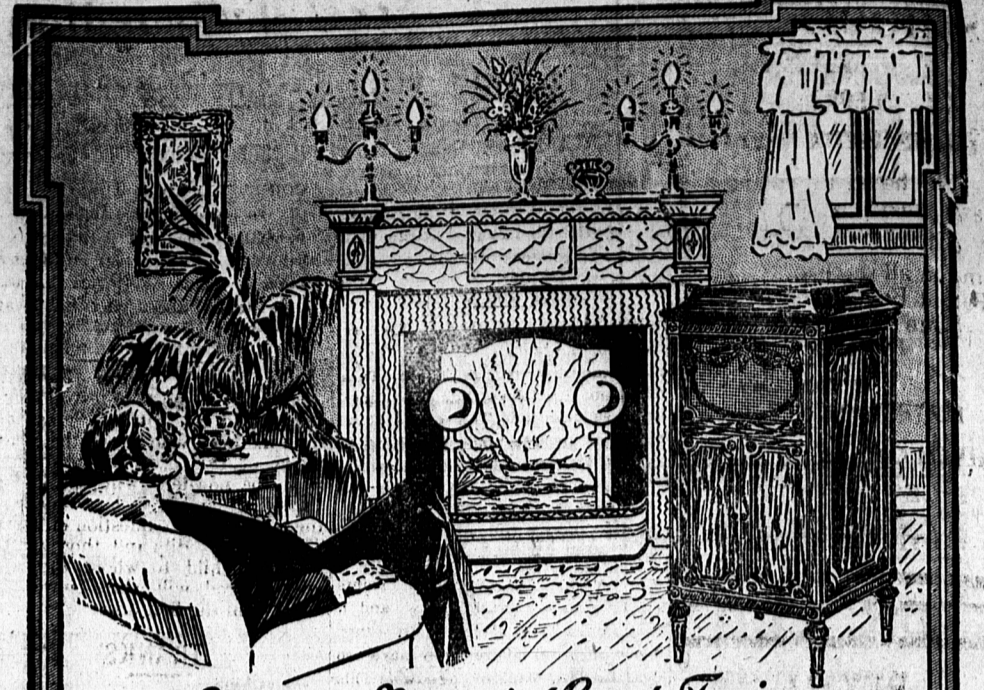
Three hundred and one men were taken to Belfast by the British destroyer Mounsey, the only vessel which made an attempt to rescue in the terrific gale when the Kashmir, another vessel in the convoy with the Otranto, rammed the Otranto amidships.

Seventeen men were picked up alive on the Scottish coast.

Of the 699 American soldiers on board the Otranto 310 were landed. Seventeen were rescued alive at Islay, leaving 372 unaccounted for.

New War Minister Pro-ally.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—The new Turkish War Minister is Iszet Pasha, former commander-in-chief of the Turkish forces, according to advices received by the Evening News. He is bitterly opposed to the defunct pro-German Cabinet.
