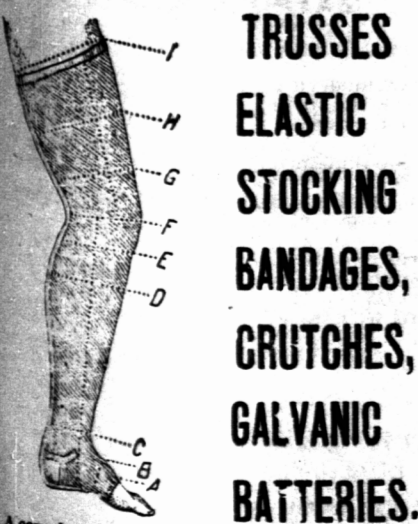

Berlin, Oct. 18.—The Emperor's trip to the Holy Land will cost, exclusive of present and liberal 'tips,' at least \$1,250,000. The costly gifts to the Sultan of Turkey and to the Emperor's figure up from about \$750,000 to \$1,000,000.
