### Handsome Donation to the P. E. I. Hospital

### NOW READY FOR USE

### Messrs. Johnson & Johnson Furnishes Case with Three Dozen Bottles.

Yesterday it was the GUARDIAN'S privilege to see the large dispensing case presented by Court Mount Stephen, No. 3741, Independent Order of Foresters to the New Prince Edward Island Hospital, which was opened a few days ago.

The case is built of ash with antique oak finish, ten feet in length and nine feet in height, fitted with glass doors. The shelves are moveable and can be adjusted any height required. In the base are five cupboards and five drawers; and slides, the latter to be used, if necessary, for extra counter room.

The case is in two sections, the upper half having a glass front and the entire construction of the case is from plans approved of by the Matron of the hospital. In a suitable place surmounting the case in a glass space is the following inscription in gold.

"Dispensing case presented to this Hospital by Court Mount Stephen, No. 3741, Independent Order of Foresters, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, March 9th, A. D. 1900.

The case will be on exhibition in Messrs. Mark Wright & Co's show window today and on Monday next it will be removed to the Hospital where it has been allotted a special position in the dispensing room.

Messrs. Mark Wright & Co. were the manufacturers and the handsome finish placed on this piece of work reflects credit on the above firm.

Messrs. Johnson & Johnson have furnished the case with 3 dozen bottles which is certainly a very handsome style of shelf ware, blown in iron moulds, special care being taken to make the bottles smooth and well finished.
