A Geneva correspondent of the Toronto Globe writes to that paper concerning the dangerous features of International Trade with Russia. After showing that Russia owes to the outside world well over \$500,000,000 (1,000,000,000 gold rubles) on her current trade account alone, and that Russia's unfavorable trade balance during the past six months has amounted to more than \$75,000,000, the survey specially concludes that "the suspension of payments of the United Soviet Socialist Republics is inevitable before long."

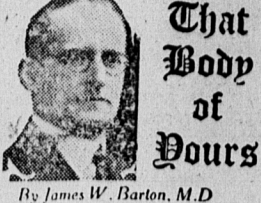
Trelle's Achievement

(Montreal Gazette) Herman Trelle, farmer, of Wempeby, Alberta, comes into permanent possession of the International Wheat Cup, having won the wheat championship three times at the great Chicago Fair. This is the first time that the trophy has been awarded permanently, and Trelle's victory is unprecedented. He is wheat king because of his experiments and intelligent cultivation of the fine soil of Northern Alberta, where he has made his home. Trelle has a farm of 1,000 acres situated 450 miles north of the international boundary, and he has 550 acres in crop, the remainder being virgin soil. This land is so far north that it drains northward into the Arctic. There the summer days are long and the sunshine makes the grain shoot up quickly. It is a hard and flinty wheat that Trelle grows, the very best quality that can be raised, proof of which claim is to be found in the championship that he has won three times at Chicago, where the most expert grain growers in the world compete for honors.

However, this may be, it remains to the advantage of other nations, many of whose assets are "frozen" in an embarrassed Germany, to set that country on its economic feet and to disregard the apparent threat of the Hitlerite swing.

An eminent medical authority warns us against an increase in tuberculosis, as one of the results of the depression. The hardship and under-nourishment endured by the destitute take their dread toll. In Germany immediately after the war there was a startling increase in tuberculosis because the people had so long been reduced to short rations, lacking in the ingredients that make for health and vigor, and the country has not yet got back to the former rate of mortality.



SPINAL CURVATURE DUE TO PAINFUL HIP

You may meet a friend or acquaintance whom you have not seen for some time and you are surprised to see that his body is now twisted or bent to one side. He tells you that the lower part of his back and one hip have been giving him considerable pain for some time, and that this has actually given him a curvature of the spine. And this is really true, because it is his efforts to draw his body away from the painful spot or side that is causing the curvature or deformity.

Sometimes an inflammation is set up in this joint from infected teeth or tonsils and this causes the pain in lower back and hip. Usually the spine can be brought in a straight line by relieving the joint condition. If due to an injury strapping the joint as with any sprain will give relief.

Where All Look Alike (Toronto Globe) Evidently there is in a British court of law very little of a sentimental nature. The presiding Judge appears to have a strong conviction that his business is the administration of justice, and is not impressed by the personality of accused persons. Not long ago a Peer of the realm, found guilty of dishonest manoeuvres in the financial world, was promptly sent to prison. Malefactors of all degrees know that, once their guilt is proved, punishment is certain to follow; which no doubt accounts for the fact that many jails in the Old Country have few inmates, and that several have been closed altogether for lack of business.

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Besides being a master grower of hard red spring and durum wheat, Trelle is noted for his oat, rye, flax and peas crops, in all of which fields he has won honors at Chicago. As wheat king he brings fame to Alberta, in particular, and to the Dominion as a whole. His accomplishments this year are likely to have a widespread effect in attracting settlers to his district. His victory likewise draws world attention to the prime qualities of Canadian wheat at a time when the grain is a universal topic. In a review of the wheat situation, as regards all countries last year, Broomhall, universally recognized as an authority placed Canadian hard wheat in the lead, declaring that its qualities will keep it in the foremost place. He further stated that complaints are being received from European bakers as to the inferior quality of the flour and its decline in baking qualities, due to an absence of good hard grain for mixing purposes. This was when Canadian wheat was not being bought on the Continent, as formerly. Broomhall then remarked that the demand for Canadian grain would increase. The advertisement that Herman Trelle's winning of the International Wheat Cup for the first time permanently, gives to Canadian grain, is likely to be wheat champion last year, and in 1929 another Albertan, Joseph H. B. Smith, of Wolf Creek, in the McLeod River Valley, held the crown, having succeeded Trelle, who now succeeds himself. These two men have proven the worth of the Canadian prairie soil as a bed for wheat and as a field for the intelligent grower. They and others like them are serving their country well in the promotion of one of its greatest industries.
