Tourists Bring Him to Capital—Already his work was bringing favorable attention from the Church Consistory. As a reward, he was named summer minister of the American Church in The Hague, the Netherlands. One day a group of tourists from Washington heard him preach. Shortly thereafter he received a call to Washington's New York Avenue Presbyterian Church. When he arrived in Washington he found himself pastor of a decaying church that had little more than a notable tradition. Only a few blocks from the White House, it was known as "The Church of the Presidents" because most of the Chief Executives who happened to be Presbyterians had worshipped there. Abraham Lincoln, John Quincy Adams, Fillmore, Pierce, Harrison and Johnson had sat in its pews. To a stagnant congregation, Dr. Sizoo brought new vitality. Soon the church was jammed to the topmost gallery at Sunday services.

Dr. J. R. Sizoo To Be Minister At St. Nicholas

WASHINGTON PASTOR ACCEPTS CALL TO FIFTH AVE. CHURCH TO SUCCEED DR. MACLEOD.

NEW YORK, March 16—The Rev. Dr. Joseph Richard Sizoo, minister of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, Washington, has accepted a call to the pulpit of the Collegiate Church of St. Nicholas, Fifth Avenue at Forty-eighth Street, the oldest Protestant church in the United States. He will preach his first sermon at St. Nicholas on Sunday, May 3.

Announcement of Dr. Sizoo's acceptance was made yesterday at the 11 a.m. service by the Rev. Dr. Malcolm James MacLeod, whose retirement on December 30, 1934, marked the end of his twenty-fifth year as minister of St. Nicholas. The congregation had been pastorless since then, and it was not until last Thursday that its governing board, the Consistory of the Collegiate Reformed Protestant Dutch Church in the City of New York, extended a call to the new minister.

The call was extended by a unanimous vote by the six clergymen and the twenty-eight lay members of the Consistory after they had first consulted Dr. Sizoo concerning his acceptance. They remembered that Dr. Sizoo once had turned down a call to the Marble Collegiate Church, Fifth Avenue at Twenty-ninth Street, and they were determined to avoid a possible recurrence of such an embarrassment. "We supposed him to be immovable," Dr. Henry Everett Cobb, senior minister of the Consistory, explained last night. "But he is a man who has a very deep sense of religious spirit and responsibility and he was finally persuaded to accept the tremendous opportunities in this city."

Returns to Childhood Church

Dr. Cobb said that "the matter of salary was not discussed." It was known, however, that Dr. MacLeod was the highest paid clergyman in the Reformed Church in America, his salary being \$18,000. Salaries of other leading clergy in the church are almost as high. Dr. Cobb receiving \$15,000 as does the Rev. Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, pastor of the Marble Church. Unlike most other denominations, there has been no salary cut since the depression began.

In accepting the St. Nicholas pastorate, Dr. Sizoo will return to the denomination of his childhood. with hundreds turned away. Perhaps his most successful feature was the Lenten Bible class, held Tuesday in the ballroom of the Mayflower Hotel and sponsored each year by the capital's social leaders. Sponsors for the current season included Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Mrs. Cordell Hull and Mrs. Charles Evans Hughes. In February, 1935, Dr. Sizoo astounded churchmen by rejecting a call to the wealthy Marble Collegiate Church, in New York. The refusal was considered unusual both because of the pulpit possibilities of the Marble Church and because of its \$15,000 salary offer.
