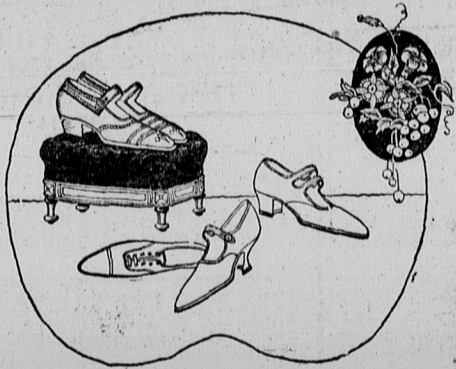

trary we have maintained that the very essence of the Protective principle for which we and the Conservative Party stand, involves the very lowest tariff, and even freedom from duty of things not made in Canada, AND ESSENTIAL FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF OUR AGRICULTURE, OUR MINES, FISHERIES AND OTHER SOURCES OF PRODUCTION. And in practice the Government demonstrated it, BY CUTTING OFF THE INCREASED DUTY ON THESE THINGS BY THE LAURIER GOVERNMENT.

"IT THEN FABRICATES FACTS AND FIGURES ON A WHOLE SALE SCALE. This province, it says, pays 'AN AVERAGE ANNUAL AMOUNT OF NOT LESS THAN \$2000,000, in customs duties.' With the Customs returns before it, showing the total customs duties collected in this province to be somewhere around that trifling little amount of about \$120,000 a year or scarcely more than the increased subsidy granted by the Borden Government, to our Matheson Government. And yet the Patriot insults the intelligence of its readers by



presuming upon their ignorance when it dishes out these home-made FABRICATIONS. Its next EXAGGERATION comes in 'fertilizers. It says, 'The amount paid by our farmers—in the way of fertilizer charges upon fertilizer would amount to upwards of \$100,000.' People who know the stretching capacity of the Patriot will not be surprised to learn that crude fertilizer in every form is free of duty, and that on what is known as special compound, a small amount was collected, amounting in 1919 to \$98,473.50. NOT FOR THIS ISLAND ONLY, BUT FOR THE WHOLE OF CANADA. By another FABRICATION it conjures up a further duty of \$50,000 on fishermen's equipment, when if it could only read the public documents before it, it would learn that all of these are on the free list, AND NOT ONE CENT OF DUTY COLLECTED UPON THEM. What reprobate can the people of this province pace upon a paper that deliberately and flagrantly attempts to practice these deceptions upon them. They had samples enough of this kind of stuff in the Local election of 1919. Are they going to allow themselves to be gulled by the same kind of unreliable office mode trash?

## Annual Appeal for Financial Support

Three years ago the trustees informed the public of Queen's and King's counties that each year on the first of November, they would ask for a substantial collection to be made in each school district and that no other money collections would be made or authorized by the management. This arrangement has been strictly adhered to, the collections have been regularly made and the trustees wish to thank all contributors and collectors for their support which has made it possible to carry on the Hospital work.

This year, we are changing the date of the collections from November 1st to October 1st. We think it will be easier for the collectors to carry on their work during the usually finer weather of the first week of October and we also wish to avoid clashing with the collection dates of any other charitable institution or society.

This year we must ask you for more money than ever before. We closed our books last year with a deficit of \$4709.85, due to the increased prices of nearly everything used in the Hospital and also to the much greater number of patients treated than in any previous year.

We have installed a laboratory this year which will cost us over \$2500.00 and we are adding a thoroughly qualified dietitian to the staff which will mean an added outlay, but one which will be in the best interest of the patients. The repairs to the building and replacement of equipment will be fully as great if not greater than last year, and in every way possible the trustees are trying to provide a thoroughly equipped Hospital where our sick may receive as good treatment as can be obtained in any Hospital in Canada.

All of this takes money, a very great deal of money, and we therefore strongly appeal to you for every dollar you can possibly afford to give us.
