EDUCATION BY THE FILM

pictures, the speaker said the comparative failure of the so-called film in cinema theatres was largely due to the attempt to satisfy the student and at the same time secure the interest of the popular audience for financial reasons. It was also declared that an investigation of the popularity of different films among school children had shown that in almost every instance the educational film was at the bottom of the list.

That pictures of some sort have ever been a means of human education is beyond dispute. The alphabet itself is a miniature picture gallery. Book illustrations have done excellent work. The transfer of scenes and illustrative lessons to the silver screen is the logical development of these earlier efforts. Yet everything depends upon the correctness and quality of the films thus portrayed.

"Educational Pictures" is a motto device today familiar to the public in every exhibition of the scenario productions. But it is obvious that the title is a ruse, and covers the broadcasting of a vast amount of trash that no honest mind could connect with the superscription. The travesty, however, does not impair the possibilities or values of the movie film rightly directed to an educational purpose. Whether the extension of movies to the schools and colleges would prove a positive hindrance to sound reading, personal research and the culture of intense studious habits are matters that require careful consideration. Human nature is prone to take the line of least resistance, in this as in other adventures of the mind. What seems incontestable is that if the educational films are to fulfil their true design the making of them cannot be left to producers whose sole objective is the box-office receipts and whose only test therefore is how the scenario will strike the fancy. If the educational code is to preserve its high standards, and is to be kept from becoming a bewildering emotion merely, the screen pictures devoted to this end imply the recruiting of the best and wisest brains for their production.
