#### They Stand Pledged.

- Hon. George Forbes.—No.
- Hon. H. C. McDonald I will advocate and support such a measure for the city of Charlottetown as will best prevent the introduction of intoxicating liquors into country districts, at the same time having due regard for any request made in this respect by a large majority of our citizens.
- Hon. Wm. Campbell—I am pledged by the electors of the district not to vote for a license system unless asked to do so by the Temperance Alliance.
- Hon. J. W. Richards—I would be guided by the wishes of the temperance people.
- D. A. McKinnon—My view is decidedly in favor of a prohibitory law. To pass an Act like a license Act will never do. I will do my best for temperance.
- Hon. Peter McNutt—I am opposed to a license law. I am also opposed to free rum.

- Hon. D. Farquharson. Ne.

## SENATOR BOULTON

### Dead in Russell, Man., of Congestion.

### SKETCH OF HIS LIFE

#### Was one of Riel's Prisoners And Was Sentenced to Be Shot.

WINNIPEG, May 13.—(Special)—Senator Boulton died today at Russell, Manitoba, after eight days illness of congestion of the lungs.

Hon. Charles Arkel Boulton was born at Coburg, Ont. April 17, 1841. He was son of Col. D'Arcy Boulton of the 4th Regiment Prince of Wales Canadian Dragoons. After completing his education at Upper Canada College he entered the Imperial military service and from 1858 to 1868 was an officer of Her Majesty's 100th Regiment. He thereafter held the position of Mayor in the militia battalion of Durham, Ont.

Col. Boulton went to the Northwest and was present during Riel's first rebellion in 1869-70 when he was taken prisoner and sentenced to be shot, but was reprieved at the solicitation of Sir Donald Smith and Archdeacon McLean.

Later he commanded "Boulton Scouts" during the rebellion of 1885 in the Northwest. In 1887 he was an unsuccessful candidate for the Commons in Marquette, and two years later was appointed a member of the Senate. In politics he maintained a somewhat independent attitude, declaring himself a Liberal Conservative and Free Trader. Because of his dissent from the protective policy of his leader he was frequently quoted in the Liberal Press of some years ago.

### LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

A Bill to incorporate the Montague Electric Company and was read a third time and passed.

A bill to amend the City of Charlottetown Incorporating Act was read a third time and passed.

A Bill to further amend the public School Act was referred back to committee for the purpose of making amendments. The Bill was reported agreed to with amendments.

EVENING SESSION.

The House met 9 p. m. Hon. Mr. Rogers moved the House into committee to consider a Bill to alter and amend the Act to incorporate the Masonic Temple Co. Bill reported agreed to.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson presented a Bill entitled "An act to impose a tax on certain companies and associations."

A Bill respecting assignments for the benefit of creditors was referred back to committee for the purpose of making amendments. Bill reported agreed to without amendments.

The House in committee resumed consideration of a Bill to incorporate the P. E. Island Dairying Association. Bill reported agreed to with amendments. It will be read a 3rd time tomorrow.

A Bill respecting the profession of medicine and surgery was referred back to committee for the purpose of making amendments. The Bill was reported agreed to with amendments.

Mr. Speaker read a message from His Honor the Lieutenant Governor regarding the issuing of debentures not exceeding \$17,000.

Hon. H. C. McDonald presented a bill regarding Dower.

House adjourned to meet at 10 tomorrow.

## RESTORE COUNTY

### Lines as Boundaries for Election Districts.

### A GOVERNMENT BILL

#### Dealing Principally with Ontario But Affects P. E. Island.

OTTAWA, May 15.—(Special)—Notice will be given to-morrow of the Government Redistribution Bill.

The principle of country boundary lines will be laid down, except in one or two cases. The main object is to restore things as they were prior to the gerrymander act of 1882.

The Bill will not offset materially any of the provinces outside of Ontario.

In Prince Edward Island the old electoral districts will be restored in accordance with county boundary lines.

New Brunswick or Nova Scotia will not be touched.
