Mr. Gardiner's Speech

could not explain it. One British official offered the explanation that German mothers are industrious and make the best possible use of both food and clothing. The reports received everywhere were that no people have starved in these areas. There were no complaints made to me either in the displaced persons' camps or elsewhere. That everything which could reasonably be expected was not being done, and there was every evidence that people are being as well provided with shelter, clothing and food in these occupied areas as could be expected as soon after the disaster of war, for which enemy leaders had been responsible, and which had been inflicted upon the world. I went further and pointed out that Essen had a population of 600,000 people. Before the bombing attacks started all but 50,000 were moved out. There were less than 800 persons killed. Since the war 500,000 have returned to the city where conditions are the worst. The German authorities told me only one twentieth of the present 500,000 are living under the conditions shown me as the worst in the occupied areas and they would all be moved to better quarters shortly.

Will Starve Unless

The people in Europe can only produce at the best 60 per cent of the food they require under the best of conditions and in some areas not more than 40 per cent. There are millions of them, 40 per cent to 50 per cent of the food they require must come in from outside and much of it must come from America. There is nothing new about that and the condition will continue much the same when the aftermath of war has passed. People will starve there any time unless there is something done. There is no necessity, however, for having our people worked into a hysteria over something which requires only the application of reason to reach an understanding that if it is good business to produce surplus food and send it to an area which will always provide Canada with its best market for food and clothing, Western Europe and Britain, where 400,000,000 people live in an area half the size of Canada.

Real Suffering

I saw evidences in all these homes and elsewhere of a type of suffering—the aftermath of war—which no amount of food or clothing supplied can remove. It is the suffering which is written on the haunted faces of young girls and old women and is a condition which can only be partially removed by kindness and a removal of the persons who are associated with the war period.

Apart from this latter type of suffering, I saw as great suffering as a result of lack of the necessities of life in Western Canada in the period of depression and drought as I saw in the worst they could show me in Essen. Much of this suffering in the West was due to drought, but a greater cause was the conditions created by actions taken in the twenties and thirties by leaders in these same areas now calling for food. I did not hesitate to state government leaders looking for assistance now should guard against creating similar conditions in the wheat growing areas of Canada in future. In the thirties the speculative grain trade was unable to raise the price to the Western farmer, but today with another crop failure and without speculation churches and the Red Cross are not collecting parcels for the West but for Europe.

Regular Meeting Of Presbytery Of P. E. Island

The Presbytery held its regular meeting on November 11th in the Kirk Hall of St. James' Church, with the Moderator, the Rev. T.A. A. Duke in the chair, and the Clerk, the Rev. T.H.B. Somers at the desk. The Rev. G. C. Webster, Moderator, the Rev. D. Nicholson, Rev. R.D. MacLean, Rev. C.D. Henderson, Rev. F.N. Young, Rev. W.A. Young, Rev. G.B. Cunningham and the Rev. D. Nicholson were also present, together with the following elders: Mr. Fred Clerk, Alberton; Mr. R.A. MacKenzie, Belfast; Mr. M.J. Stewart, Caladonia; Mr. J.R. Burnett, The Kirk, Charlottetown; Mr. A.A. MacDonald, Zion Church, Charlottetown; Mr. Stewart MacKinnon, Highfield, and Dr. J.A. MacKinnon, Summerside.

The congratulations of the Court were extended to the Rev. and Mrs. F. Norman Young on the occasion of their recent marriage, and to the Rev. T.H.B. Somers, upon his recent election to the Moderatorship of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces.

In response to the expressed will of the congregations concerned, the Presbytery united the congregations of Alberton and West Point in one pastoral charge under the Rev. Geo. B. Cunningham, B.A., of Alberton.

The Court received the minutes of a congregational meeting held at West Point and certified the incorporation of its duly-elected board of trustees under the Provincial statute of 1933. Steps are being taken to secure a new manse at Alberton.

The Presbytery was presented with a unanimous call from the congregation of St. John's, Belfast, to the Rev. R.S. Quigley, Ph.D., of Marion Bridge, N.S. Approval was given to the call and its transmission ordered to the Presbytery of Cape Breton.

Reporting on Home Missions, Rev. G.C. Webster reported that all congregations in the Presbytery were now permanently staffed, except North Tryon-Bradalbane where the deaconess, Miss Mary MacKenzie was doing such splendid work.

Reporting for S.S. and Y.P.S., Rev. Norman Young described a very successful young people's rally at Kensington on Labour Day and a Thanksgiving weekend conference in Halifax, attended by Island young people. Rev. T.A.A. Duke outlined his work of conducting Sunday School by post.

The Rev. G.C. Webster reported that to September 29th, the Presbytery had contributed \$20,173 towards "The Advance for Christ" and that it is forthcoming seven Presbyteries in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces.

Reporting for the committee on Colleges and Students, the Rev. T.H.B. Somers recommended that Mr. Gardiner Dalziel, of Kensington, at present a student in arts at Acadia University, be certified to the Senate of King's College, Toronto, as a candidate for the ministry.

Reporting as treasurer, Rev. T.H.B. Somers stated that practically all congregations had now paid in their 1947 Presbytery dues.

Elections to office for the ensuing year resulted as follows: Session Records, Rev. Geo. B. Cunningham. Clerk and Treasurer, Rev. T.H.B. Somers.

Missions, Rev. G.C. Webster. Statistics, Rev. T.H.B. Somers. Session Records, Rev. Geo. B. Cunningham. Radio Broadcasting, Rev. R.D. MacLean.

"The Record," Rev. C. Carnegie. Remits, Rev. C. Carnegie. The retiring Moderator, Rev. T.A.A. Duke then installed the Rev. R.D. MacLean of Montague in the chair, who thanked the Court for the honour of the office and asked for their loyal cooperation. On motion of the Clerk the warmest thanks of the Presbytery were extended to the Rev. T.A.A. Duke for the kindly, dignified and efficient manner in which he had discharged the duties of his office during the past year.

Announcement was made that the next regular meeting of the Presbytery would be held on March 2nd, 1948, in Zion Church, Charlottetown, and the Court was dismissed with the Benediction by the Moderator.
