## Heavy Oxford Crew Aided By Choppy Sea Defeats Cantabs In Rowing Classic

PUTNEY-ON-THAMES, Eng., April 3.—(CP)—Striking long sweeping, powerful strokes that defied a headwind sometimes reaching the proportions of a gale, Oxford University's top-heavy crewmen pulled themselves to a two-length victory over a lighter, less robust Cambridge eight in Saturday's 90th renewal of the interarsity rowing classic on the Thames.

It was the second consecutive triumph for the dark blue and Oxford supporters hailed it as a revival of the Oxonians' winning tradition of o.d. all but forgotten in the 13 successive victories scored by Cambridge crews from 1924 to 1936. Of the 90 races since the classic was founded in 1829, Cambridge oars have won 47, Oxford 42; the race of 1877 was a dead heat.

### Choppy Course

The choppy course was made to order for the Oxford huskies, outweighing Cambridge by seven pounds apiece, and they finished the 4 1/4-mile winding course well within the limits of their strength. But the Cambridge eight, famed for the subtleties of steering a skilful course around the many bends and outmanoeuvring their opponents for position, found themselves altogether at sea in the heavy going and crossed the finish line exhausted, leaning heavily on their oars.

They had won the toss for position, choosing the shaded Surrey side of the river, but it was of no avail. Oxford went into the lead within the first 50 yards.

## Oshawa Team Advances To Meet Perth

TORONTO, April 3.—(CP)—Super sniping by diminutive Doc Dafoe, Oshawa junior, shot the Oshawa team under Sudbury Wings and dropped them into discard in the race for the Memorial Cup, Dominion junior hockey trophy.

### Force Fourth Game

## Flyers Oust Falcons From Cup Playoffs

(By Ross Mulro, Canadian Press Staff Writer) OTTAWA, April 3.—(CP)—Cornwall Flyers bumped Palm Beach Falcons out of the Allan Cup playoffs here Saturday night, winning 4-2 in the second game of their two-of-three game series.

Flyers won the first game 5-1 in Toronto and advanced into the eastern Canada final meeting Quebec Aces, victors over Moncton Maroons, the Maritime Champions, in the first game of another two-game playoff series in Montreal tomorrow night.

The second game will be here April 6 and if necessary also in Ottawa April 8. The winner will play the western champion in the Allan Cup final in Calgary.

Two goals in the first period and two in the second gave Cornwall the victory. Falconbridge scored the goal in the first and another in the second.

Padding back on a stonewall defensive game in the final frame, Flyers held off a torrid Falcon attack with the northerners outkicked around the net. Big Mike McMahon and Farnand Gilie slammed back dozens of Falcon attacks in the last five minutes, and their wrapping body checks went a long way in keeping Falconbridge off the score sheet in that period.

The game was rough throughout, with seven penalties handed out in the first period, four in the second and one in the last.

## Surprising Black Hawks Advance To Cup Finals By Defeating Amerks 3-2

By WILLIAM H. HUMSDAY Canadian Press Staff Writer NEW YORK, April 3.—(CP)—Chicago's Black Hawks, the team none of the experts rated a chance, smashed their way to the Stanley Cup finals here tonight, when they downed New York Americans 3-2 in the final of a best-of-three game series.

Finishing third in the National Hockey League's American division last season, the Hawks were not qualified for the playoffs. They nosed out the world champion Detroit Red Wings in the stretch drive. The victory tonight sends the Black Hawks to the playoffs.

The only American-born coach in big-time hockey, in his rookie year as an N.H.L. mentor, the former referee caused two major upsets in eliminating the Canadian Hawks and the Americans in the cup chase.

Lorne Carr fired the star shots' first marker with but 20 seconds of play remaining in the first period. Jack Shill rested in the penalty box. The Americans held the advantage until late in the second session when Seibert blazed a hard shot past goalie Earl Robertson.

Before the period closed, Alex Levisky, another American-born star, flipped the puck just under the cross bar. The light did not flash but Dr. Albert Suprenant of Montreal, the goal judge, said two fans held his arms and although the Americans protested, the counter was allowed.

Romnes' goal late in the final period came as he broke away with Paul Thompson from an American gang attack but even a two-goal disadvantage failed to halt the lightning New Yorkers. Less than a minute later they struck back, Red Beattie scoring. In a desperate last-minute effort, Manager Red Dutton pulled goalie Robertson and sent out six forwards.

## Black Hawks Are Jubilant Over Victory

(By Sam Robertson) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) NEW YORK, April 3.—There was a high time in the nest of Chicago's high-flying Black Hawks tonight after they had scored their second amazing upset to skate into the Stanley Cup final.

Every Hawk was a hero to his fellow-player when they reached their dressing room to celebrate their 3-2 triumph over New York Americans in the third and deciding game of the semi-final round of hockey's world series.

For Alex Levisky, who scored the Hawks' bitterly-disputed second goal, and Doc Romnes, who riled the "big third marker," it was "the biggest thrill of our lives."

"That shot of mine hit the upper part of the net," the grinning Levisky said. "That was only my fourth score of the season, but you'll have to admit I picked the right spot for it."

Manager Bill Stewart, who has attained a good measure of fame by guiding a club into the title finals in his first season of hockey master-minding, pranced about the Chicago room like a schoolboy, congratulating each player with a tooth-rattling slap on the back.

He declared to predict the outcome of the cup series against Toronto Maple Leafs.

"I'll just say we'll be a tough gang to beat," he commented. "The boys are in good shape and you've seen how they'll fight." He revealed the grinning Levisky, revealed tonight, he would not attempt to retain his marriage title won last year in the Boston marathon.

Instead, he will attend to his duties at Verdun police headquarters where he was given equipment after he returned as winner of the Boston classic last year. Two months leave was granted for his trip to Sydney, Young explained tonight, and Mayor Herve Ferland had told him he could not guarantee his job would be waiting if he went to Boston.

BERLIN, April 3.—(AP)—The Catholic clergy made no mention in churches today to next Sunday's plebiscite on Austro-German union.

Even at Fulda, where D. N. B., the official news agency, yesterday issued a declaration appealing for an affirmative vote which is said bishop for the Fulda diocese, would read today, there was silence on the subject of Austria.

Some Nazis in the congregation expressed surprise, saying they had been led to expect priests' read statements on the plebiscite.

Mass was celebrated and sermons were preached as usual in the cathedrals of Cologne, Munich, Würzburg, Breslau and Berlin.
