A victory for Brooklyn today in the third and final game of the last series between the clubs could cut the Red Birds' lead to one-half a game. On the other hand, a Card victory could make the St. Louis nine virtually sure of the pennant with a 2-1-2 game lead.

The Cards grabbed the advantage yesterday afternoon when they shaded Brooklyn 1-0 in a thriller that went right to the ninth inning and was decided by catcher Joe Garagiola's single with the bases loaded.

In the nightcap, Prescher Row Jossed a two-hitter to put Brooklyn back in the battle. One big inning—the fourth—gave Brooklyn all its five runs and the Dodgers won 5-0. The Cards used up three pitchers in an attempt to halt Brooklyn.

The Cards now have eight games left to play in the waning schedule and Brooklyn nine. That would give the Cards a slight edge in addition to their 1-2-game lead.
