IN MEMORIAM

MR. CHARLES MYERS.

The death occurred yesterday morning somewhat unexpectedly, of Mr. Charles Myers, Prince Street, after an illness of only a few days. The deceased, who was in his 85th year, and was a prominent and successful farmer in lake Verde, had retired some four years ago from active duty, and removed with his family to Charlottetown, where he resided until his death. He leaves to mourn his wife and one daughter, and three sons, James, of British Columbia, Rev. C. A. Myers and Rev. A. J. W. Myers, Toronto, both ministers of the Presbyterian Church of Canada. The Rev. C. A. arrived from Toronto on Monday night in response to a telegram advising him of the illness of his father. The other sons, who are both in the west at present, are regrettably unable to come. The suddenly bereaved family will have the deep sympathy of a large circle of friends in their sorrow. The funeral takes place tomorrow at 1:30, the service being held in Zion Church.
