ITALIAN MEMORIAL TO FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE

Almost everyone knows that Florence Nightingale was born in the city of Florence, after which she was named. Her parents resided at that period at Bellogardo, a suburb on the side the Porta Romana, where they occupied the fine old fifteenth-century villa known as La Colomba.

Recently Italy and the British colony combined to pay a tribute of pride and affection to the memory of the famous Englishwoman whom the City of Flowers yet claims as one of her heroic daughters. The Italian Government willingly consented to the erection of a memorial in the cloister of Santa Croce, the Westminister Abbey of Italy. In the cloister beneath the arcade, which looks upon an ancient garden, has been placed the memorial, which is the work and gift of the sculptor, F. W. Sargent, and is extremely beautiful and appropriate in its classic simplicity. It represents Florence Nightingale as "The Lady of the Lamp," the touching name conferred on her by the wounded whom she tended so devotedly during the Crimea, and by which future generations will continue to know her. Sargent did not attempt to reproduce the lineaments of the original, but has represented an ideal figure in white marble thrown into relief by a dark background. In the hand is a lamp held aside in the position of one thus better able to see the object at which the down-bent eyes appear to be gazing. The monument bears the inscription: FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE 1820-1910 The Heroine of the Crimea
