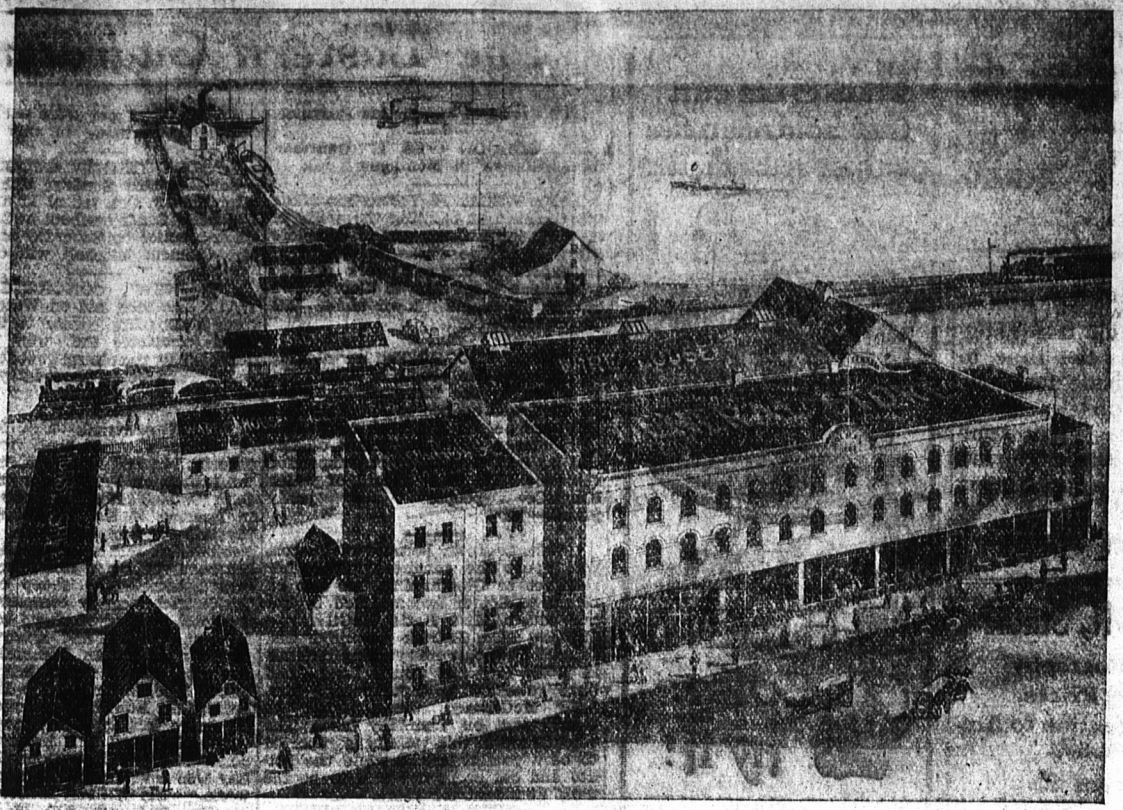
—MR. F. C. MORRISSEY is on a business trip to Summerside. Y

—Mrs. Frank Mullally and little daughter Gladys, have returned to their home in Souris, East, after visiting friends in Kensington.

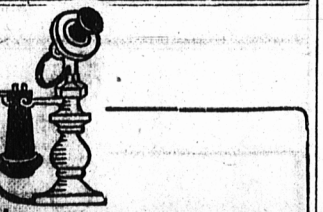
