San Marino On Verge Of Financial Ruin

SAN MARINO, Italy, May 19 — (Reuters) — The oldest and smallest republic in the world, San Marino, founded 1,600 years ago, is on the threshold of financial ruin unless the Allies agree to pay a bill for war damage estimated at the equivalent of \$10,000,000 put forward by the Republic's authorities.

Overlooking the shores of the Adriatic, some 12 miles from the Italian town of Rimini, the tiny republic now is passing through the gravest financial crisis since it was founded in the year 300 A.D. The republic's claims, which have been laid before the Allied authorities and the United States and British representatives to the Holy See by Dr. Mario Moresca, consul-general of San Marino in Rome, are based on the destruction caused by an Allied air raid June 26, 1944.

During this raid, San Marino authorities say, extensive damage was done to the republic's capital of the same name and at least 65 citizens were killed and many others wounded.

The Allies according to reports here, replied to the claim by maintaining that the Germans were using San Marino railway station as a dump for their munitions and that the raid was a regrettable necessity of war.

Later, it is claimed here, the Allies admitted in a letter that there was no such evidence to sustain the alleged presence of German munition in the railway station and no other bombings took place.

Details of the damage is contained in a large volume presented by the San Marino Government to the Allied Commission in Rome in April, 1945, as well as to the American and the British embassies and Allied representatives at the Vatican.

Included in the bill are claims for damage allegedly sustained through the occupation of the republic by the British Eighth Army in the autumn of 1944. British troops captured the tiny republic on Oct. 20 while Canadian elements of the Eighth Army were advancing northward along the Adriatic Coast a few miles to the east.

The government of San Marino maintains that it is absolutely incapable of meeting the requests of citizens who suffered loss through the raid and who are pressing their claims for reparations.

The government claims despite the suppression of the republic's liberties by the Italian Fascist regime, that the republic was never completely overthrown as an independent state which maintained rigid neutrality in the war.

In fact, San Marino declared war on Germany, in 1914 and never signed any peace document in 1918 or after. She was still technically "at war" with Germany in 1939 and can almost claim to be one of the first, if not the very first, of the Allies of the Second World War.

Covering some 32 square miles, San Marino has a gallant history of quiet, progressive and peaceful rule for the 1,600 years of her existence.

Founded by two simple workmen — Marino and Leo — the original settlement, which centred round the 2,250-foot peak of Monte Titino, today numbers some 18,000 inhabitants living for the most part in the three main towns of San Marino, Borgo Maggiore and Serravalle.

The republic is governed by a sovereign grand council of 60 members with legislative and administrative powers, elected for six years by universal suffrage.

This grand council in turn elects two captains regent, who have executive power. These captains are elected every six months and are re-eligible only every three years. It is one of the little republic's proudest boasts that never until the last war had her boundaries been violated by invading armies.

TO KEEP FIT KEEP SLIM

There is no getting around it, glamour goes with a middle spread fast. But that's not the worst thing about the dreaded middle spread. When your figure sags, a lot of your zip and zest for living slips away. I surmise that most of the requests for exercises from women over 40 are as much for the joy of feeling fit and trim as for their streamlining effects. At any rate, by far the largest number of requests for exercises are for the middle muscles.

The midsection is the only part of the figure that is entirely supported by muscles. Consequently, when the muscles in this area go to pot, the figure sags. Then, lacking proper support, the organs tend to crowd against each other, and this interferes with circulation, digestion and elimination. And that's why the spread brings on a middle aged feeling. The tone of these middle muscles is so important that even if you don't give a snap about streamlines, it pays to take a trio of exercises to keep the muscular girdle in healthy tone. And of course, restoring tone to the middle muscles will result in a much lovelier figure.

To be on the safe side, take preliminary abdominal exercises in a position that prevents any strain. Position: Lying flat on back, knees bent and feet flat on floor. Arms are down on floor at sides.

Movement: Draw one knee briskly back until thigh is resting on abdomen, and at the same time stretch arms up on floor overhead and pull slim through the middle by pressing small of back to the floor. Return to position, flex both knee to chest and stretch both arms up on floor overhead. Repeat slowly, but forcibly, six to eight times, later as many as you wish.

To counteract gravity, do that same exercise, but from the position of feet elevated, resting on law bench or chair seat. This position helps restore the abdominal organs to their proper place.

To reach the side abdominals and the waistline muscles, add a sidebend.

Position: Stand on knees, feet stretched out behind. Now sit back on feet. Stretch arms up overhead and clasp hands.

Movement: Pulling up firmly with the midriff muscles, bend to the side, back to position and bend to the other side. This position keeps hips anchored and makes the midriff muscles give with the stretch bend. Repeat six times, later 12, still later, 25 counts.

Purist Fly-Casters Shocked By Heretic

TORONTO, May 19 — (CP) — Fly-casters who scorn any less complex form of fishing for trout and bass are gently put in their places by Ray Bergman, one of the continent's best-known fishermen, in his latest book "With Fly, Plug and Bait" (McClelland and Stewart).

Bergman shocks the purists by devoting the opening chapter of his 640-page volume to worm-fishing for trout — though not in exactly bare-foot-booby fashion.

The book has a comprehensive section on fly-fishing but treats in detail of minnows and other live bait as a lure for trout and large and small-mouth bass. Its chapter on how to strike a fish heretically questions the dogma that a bass always pauses to turn a minnow around. And it includes such odds-and-ends as how to raise earthworms and how to thread them properly on a bass-hook.

Bergman's book — aside from its friendly expertise on fresh-water fishing to Canadians. He devotes lengthy passages to his experiences fishing for bass in Lake Erie off Port Rowan and on the St. Lawrence off Kingston; and for native trout in the fabulous lakes of Quebec's Laurentides Park.

Bergman, a freshwater fishing expert for "Outdoor Life," has cast his flies in every part of America. But he says Laurentides Park "because of its location and the management which controls it, is probably one of the outstanding brook trout-fishing places in North America."

He also pays special tribute to the act of left-handed Philippe Gagnon, Quebec's general superintendent of parks: "Incidentally, Mr. Gagnon is an angler of rare ability and probably knows more about this northern brook trout fishing than most of us."

Something new in Bergman's chapter on "spinning," which is thread-line fishing with a fixed spool reel which looks like a coffee-grinder and really cannot backlash. This comparatively new technique is gradually growing in popularity.
