SUMMERSIDE PAST AND PRESENT.

Down to October 1906 the Western town and other points, and the response was as prompt as possible, but the best that could be done was to keep the flames from spreading to right and left. The town was without water supply other than that supplied by wells.

The Court House and Jail, Market Building, and Hall, the Post Office, Railway Freight House, three churches, two parsonages, five hotels and scores of dwellings, warehouses and other buildings had gone down before the flames. Most of the householders lost all their effects including their winter stores of coal and provisions.

CRIPPEN AND LENEVE.

A British jury very promptly condemned Dr. Crippen to the gallows and already, the cable tells that the dreadful instrument for his execution is being erected. Very few persons can have any doubt as to his guilt, and unless capital punishment is to be altogether abolished it will be felt that his awful crime deserves and should receive the extreme penalty of the law.

The jury was more lenient with Clara Le Neve, the paramour of the murderer, who fled with him to America, and to the charge of being an accessory after the murder, they returned a verdict of "not guilty."

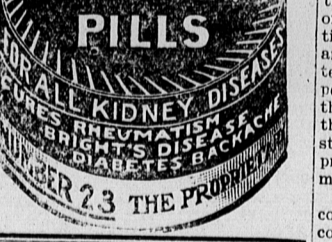
This verdict will also be pretty generally endorsed by the reading public. No one believes that Le Neve was an actual participator in the murder of Mrs. Crippen. That deed of secrecy and darkness was doubtless the act of Crippen alone. There may be more doubt as to whether Le Neve had a guilty knowledge of what had been done and with such knowledge and because of it, aided the guilty man in his effort to escape and so became an accessory after the fact. But the probability seems to be that she did not know, although she may have had strong suspicions. A murderer seldom takes anyone into his confidence with regard to his crime.

HOW TO PREVENT FOREST FIRES

CALGARY, Alta., Oct. 24.—R. H. Campbell, of the Dominion Forestry department, addressed the Canadian Club here on the vast importance to Alberta, to the prairie provinces and to the dominion of the great forests located within her borders.

"Educate people not to throw matches and lighted cigars around; place good fire patrols around; make fire breaks of lanes through forests as they do in Europe," were some of his suggestions.

The Rocky Mountains with its timber was a great asset to the country. There was immense mineral wealth in mountains and the forests were needed to develop these. The requirements of wood for fuel and lumber was increasing rapidly. It is estimated that
