...BELGO-GERMAN HATRED AT ITS HIGHEST DEGREE.

LONDON, April 20.—The Chronicle today has the following:  
North of France—The fierce fighting of a week or so ago at Drie Grachten has inflamed Belgo-German hatred to the highest degree. A frightful example of German vengeance has just been reported. The Belgians who crossed to the right bank of the Yser were surprised at night and one regiment were killed, wounded and made prisoners. A tremendous effort was thereupon made by King Albert's army, and finally the Germans were driven back to the old lines, leaving six hundred dead on the field.

Taught by experience the Belgians are organizing a system of night patrols to guard against surprises. Four days ago one of these patrols fell upon some German sentries and killed them all, as indeed it was their duty to do or otherwise the alarm would have been given to the enemy. The whole affair was a regular and characteristic episode of the nocturnal warfare that goes on every night along the whole line of trenches from Switzerland to the sea.

The German commanders determined to make an example that might prevent the sentries from being dealt with in this fashion in the future. Using some incident or other as a pretext, they had a certain number of Belgian prisoners put to death who had been captured in the fighting at Drie Grachten. The number of those "executed" was far greater than that of the sentries who had been surprised by the Belgians, according to all the rules of war.

EGYPT WELCOMES GREEK EX-PREMIER.

LONDON, April 20.—An Alexandria despatch says Former Premier Venizelos arrived there this morning and was greeted at the quay by a wildly enthusiastic crowd. He was welcomed officially by Prince Fuad, brother of Prince Hussein, Sultan of Egypt, together with British and French officials.

No preliminary announcement was made of M. Venizelos' decision to visit Alexandria. The Athens correspondent of The Petit Journal of Paris, in a despatch sent Sunday, said the proposed to spend a fortnight on the former Premier had informed him, he Island of Samos, after which he would leave for America.

NONE OF EITELS CREW HAVE LEFT INTERNED SHIP

NORFOLK, Va., April 20.—Rear-Admiral Beatty, Commandant of the Norfolk Navy Yard, referring to the despatch from Copenhagen last night declared that no officers or men had left the Eitel Friedrich since the vessel was interned here.

Second officer Victor Kroth, of the Eitel Friedrich, declared that no officers had left the ship since she arrived in Hampton Roads, March 10.

"Second Officer William Krontenn was put ashore at Buenos Ayres last September," said Kroth. "He said he had relatives in Copenhagen and wanted to go home. He was second officer on the Eitel Friedrich before the war began. We landed him and have heard nothing more of him. Krontenn did not carry any reports because we had done nothing up to that time worth reporting. No member of the crew has left the ship since that time."

Collector of Customs Hamilton declared the Copenhagen despatch was without foundation. "It would have been impossible," he said, "for any member of the crew of the Eitel Friedrich to leave this port under any false representations. The same number of men, except one who died as the result of an accident, who were on board the vessel when she came here in March, are still on board."

The Copenhagen despatch said: "Several members of the crew of the German auxiliary cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich have arrived here on board the steamer Hellig Olav from New York, headed by the second officer."

"They were provided with false

passports describing them as Swedish subjects. They are bearing secret reports to Germany from the Prinz Eitel's commander.

**CUPID BUSY ON STEAMER.**

NEW YORK, April 21.—The steamship Kroonland, of the Red Star Line, arrived in port from a cruise of 82 days to drum up trade with South America. Besides business men, she carries 35 widows and a lot of misses. She returned with four dozen of her passengers engaged to be married.

There was no minister or other official qualified to issue marriage licenses on board, so the engaged planned a grand round up at the altar in the United States.

The Kroonland carried 295 passengers. The men were representatives of commercial institutions in the United States and were sent to boom business. Many of them took wives, daughters and friends with them. They went through the Panama Canal and entirely around South America.

**PUT ON HONOR WHEN WRITING LETTERS**

LONDON, April 20.—To relieve the hard-worker censor, soldiers writing letters from the front are being put on their honor as to the contents. A special envelope has been issued to the troops in the fighting line. It is green in color and headed "On Active Service." On the flap is this declaration, which must be signed by the writer: "I certify on my honor that the contents of this letter refer to nothing but private and family matters."

**RETURN TRUE BILLS AGAINST SPIES.**

LONDON, April 20.—True bills were returned by the Grand Jury in the Old Bailey Police Court today against three alleged German spies: Kuepferle, Hahn and Muller, charged with sending military information to Germany. Anton Kuepferle professes to be an American and it is believed he comes from Brooklyn; Muller claims he is a naturalized Englishman, while Hahn admits he is a German.

Strict precautions were taken today to exclude all outsiders at the hearing. While the judge was addressing the grand jury even the ushers were turned out of the room.

When the case is heard in camera next week every person connected with it will be sworn to secrecy.
