THE ROSE BY ANOTHER NAME

The Bratt System of Sweden was instituted in 1912. Under it the country is divided into districts and the monopoly of the sale of spirits is given in each district to a group of citizens who agree to limit their profits. A mot-book or permit is issued to citizens over 21 years of age. Beer is sold without a permit. Three results have developed and are now outstanding, and strange to say these results are already paralleled under government sale in Canada. The sales of spirits have increased under the system, the permits show that the number of drinkers has increased; the number of women drinkers has also increased.

Dr. Karl Ekman, Prime Minister, sums up the results as follows: "The Bratt system fosters and spreads the drink habit instead of suppressing it."

THE LAW IS A SCHOOLMASTER

Mr. Henry A. Curran, President of the Association against the 18th (prohibition) amendment recently stated: "It seems certain that already at least of the American people are ready to vote for the repeal for the 18th amendment."

During 1931 the legislatures in 43 of the 48 states were in session. In 21 of these measures for the repeal or the popular referendum on repeal were introduced. In each of four of these, viz. California, Indiana, New Jersey and Ohio, three separate bills seeking to accomplish the repeal of the state enforcement laws by different methods were introduced and defeated. And in each of three more, Missouri, Pennsylvania, and Washington, two separate efforts to accomplish the same results were made, and failed.

And in each of fourteen states, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Oregon, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah, and Wisconsin, one bill for repeal was introduced, and defeated.

Otherwise stated, of the 32 repeal or repeal referendum bills introduced into the 1931 state legislatures, 32 were defeated! And twenty two other state legislatures met, none of which even considered the question of repeal.
