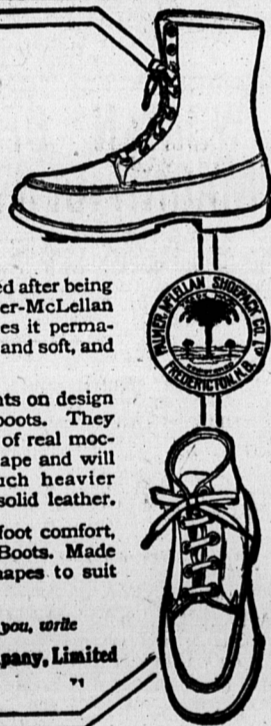

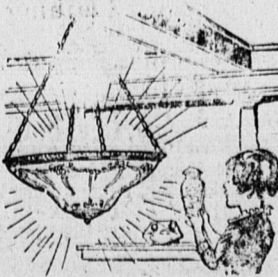

Rev. Ewen MacDougall of Charlottetown preached a very instructive sermon on "The Power of the Keys" which was listened to with rapt attention. A report from the Committee on Legislation was presented by the clerk and the Act of Incorporation was explained. The action of the Legislative Assembly in connection with the church property at Canoe Cove was strongly denounced, and it was unanimously agreed to build another church on a site to be agreed upon by the congregation of Coleman, Cape Traverse and DeSable to accommodate the fifty families thus deprived of their place of worship. It was unanimously agreed to print a new addition of the Hymn Book, and the Committee were instructed to ascertain at their earliest possible convenience the price of each book also the number required by the several congregations. Tammany Boss Indicted for Intimidation

NEW YORK, June 28.—Charles F. Murphy, Tammany leader, was one of the six men secretly indicted by the extraordinary Grand Jury, which has been investigating alleged attempts of Mr. Murphy to manufacture, into a drug, \$125,000 which he invested with Hartog's company during the war.

With Mr. Murphy were indicted Assistant District Attorney James E. Smith, John A. McCarthy, former business partner of John Murphy, brother of Charles F. Murphy, Arthur J. Baldwin, a lawyer, Ernest B. Walden, Vice-President of the Corn Products Company, and the Corn Products Company itself.

The indictments, it was learned today, charged that the defendants conspired to coerce Hartog to settle a suit for \$100,000 damages which he brought against Murphy after the latter is alleged to have withdrawn his support from Hartog's company. Bail for each defendant was fixed at \$1,000.

Hartog was head of a company which manufactured a product of which glucose is the chief ingredient. He got a \$7,000,000 order from the British Government during the war, but found difficulty in obtaining the necessary glucose. Thereupon it is alleged, he expanded his company, and when he obtained Murphy's support no longer had difficulty in getting glucose from the Corn Products Company. After Hartog and Murphy are alleged to have had a falling out, Murphy sued Hartog to recover his \$125,000 investment, and Hartog then sued Murphy, the Corn Products Company and Baldwin and McCarthy to recover \$10,000,000 profit which he said he lost as a result of the suit.

Hartog claimed Smith summoned him to force him to pay Murphy his \$125,000, but Smith asserted he had issued the summons at a time when he was engaged in prosecuting sugar profiteers.

Hartog's brother was fined \$5,000 in the Federal Court for profiteering, but Hartog himself was given a clean bill by Mr. Smith. It was charged at the time that Mr. Smith wrongfully used the process of a Grand Jury subpoena to intimidate Hartog.

RUSS. REFUGEES DESIRE TO LOCATE IN DOM.

LONDON, June 28.—Fifty men and women refugees from Petrograd, mostly husbands and wives, are just now lodged in a London poor law institution and are desirous of going together to Canada to form a community. The Foreign Office has approached the Canadian authorities, intimating that if the Dominion is willing to accept them, the Imperial authorities would assist them towards becoming established. These people are British subjects, bearing such common patronymics as Miller, Johnson, Smith, etc., but owing to their perpetual residence in Russia, many cannot speak a word of English. Because of their extreme desire to found a community among themselves, it is understood that the Canadian authorities decidedly hesitate about receiving them.
