EDITORIAL NOTES.

The death is announced of Dr. D. C. Allan of Amherst N. S. Dr. Allan was a New Brunswicker by birth, and rapidly attained popularity in his chosen profession. He was not yet 47 years of age at the time of his death. He was a Liberal in politics and was one of the delegates from his county to the great Liberal convention at Ottawa in 1893. He was elected mayor of Amherst the same year.

The Senators take things leisurely. They have adjourned their House from 28th April to May 17th and thus take three weeks holidays in the midst of the session. In the six weeks passed since Parliament opened the Senate has sat at the most but a few hours during any one day and most frequently but a few minutes daily. It is this sort of thing that gives rise to the impression in many minds that the Senate might well be dispensed with entirely. We do not share that opinion, but there is great need of an infusion of more energetic stock into the Canadian Lords. With the exception of about a dozen members the Senate as it exists today is too slow and sleepy to be a legislative body in a growing and progressive country such as Canada.

THE GUARDIAN has been shown a circular letter received by Mr. George Carter, and also by Messrs. John Newson, R. B. Norton and perhaps others, extending a cordial invitation to attend the International Commercial Congress and National Exposition of American Manufacturers to be held at Philadelphia next autumn. The Congress will be composed of delegates officially appointed by the various governments, and of duly accredited delegates from Chambers of Commerce in all parts of the world. Invitations have been sent to 115 different countries and to over 1,000 commercial bodies. The delegates will be the guests of the city of Philadelphia during their stay. The Congress will be opened by President McKinley on October 10th and will remain in daily session for two weeks, or more.

Canada's Cup.

Comodore Amelius Jarvis is determined that there shall be no delay upon the McLeod and Payne boats for the Canada Cup trial races, and although the McLeod designs are completed and are now in Oakville, work has not yet been started on the craft. The Payne design is expected to arrive about May 10. Meanwhile Mr. Jarvis is hunting up seasoned material for both vessels, and is placing options upon every bit of suitable stuff in the neighborhood, so that when work is commenced it can be rushed through.

It is expected that the boats will both be in the water by the latter end of June, the McLeod boat probably ten days ahead of the craft of English design. Both will be built in secret. Not a dimension will be revealed until the little vessels are in the water.

MARKETS.

MONTEAL APRIL 26th.—**CHEESE.**—The cheese market here is without any change, and the business doing is hardly worth talking about. In the Brockville district there has been a little trading, as noticed elsewhere. The shipments of cheese last week were 3,558 boxes, against nil last, while the total since navigation closed is 519,729, against 441,866 boxes. Butter shipments last week were 2,619 packages, and the total 72,976 packages against 39,841 packages a year ago.

BUTTER.—is just as quiet as at the recent decline, sales of finest creamery being made on the basis of 16c to 17c. Dairy is purely nominal.

EGGS.—are not in very active demand being quoted at 12c to 13c per dozen. Boom in Molasses.

MONTEAL APRIL 26

The strong feeling which developed in the market for molasses, a few days ago, continues, and private cable advices received from Barbadoes today note a sharp advance of 1 1/2c per gal on the first cost now being 13 1/2c, which figure means 31c laid down here, and even at the above price there is very little offering. The demand here is good, and there are buyers at the advance. There is also a good demand for old Barbadoes stock, and it is reported that all the round lots obtainable in Quebec have been brought up by local wholesale grocers. On spot sales of round lots of Porto Rico have been made at 29 1/2c, and Barbadoes at 30 1/2 to 31c. Cable advices from Antigua state that the market is now bare of supplies.

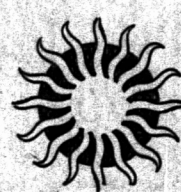
