Will Amalgamate Four Departments

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Sept. 17.—(C.P.)—Plans to absorb the Departments of Interior, Mines, Immigration and Indian Affairs into one Department of Mines and Natural Resources were announced today. Many changes have come about since those old departments were first organized and the new set-up will be designed to accommodate these changes.

The new department will be presided over by Hon. T. A. Crerar with Dr. Charles Camshell his deputy minister. The reorganization will take effect Dec. 1 and meanwhile the new executive officers will meet and develop the organization.

Nova Scotia Youth Fatally Injured

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MTEGHAN, N. S. Sept. 17.—(C.P.)—Thrown 30 feet when his bicycle swerved in front of an automobile. Ambrose Robichaud, 19-year-old Metchuan youth, was fatally injured tonight.

Robichaud suffered a broken back and other injuries. Witnesses said he swerved his bicycle into the path of an automobile driven by Harold Gault, of Saint John, N. B. Ploked up and rushed to a nearby residence, the youth died an hour later.

given, such as central location, accessibility, surf and water bathing; opportunities for deep sea fishing and boating, perpetuation of small wild life, fishing, picturesque drives and sea vista, etc.

In dealing with the bathing possibilities of the recommended area the report makes a comparison between the temperature of the water on the north shore of the Island with that of popular seaside resorts of the British Isles, and it is stated there is not much difference.

Recommendation regarding fish preserves which should materially increase the value of the fishing grounds outside the reserves, are also included in the report.

Exact Areas Not Determined...

Twenty-two possible National Park areas, says the report, "were visited on the suggestion of various residents or organizations and those found to possess the greatest National Park potentialities were re-visited and a more detailed inspection made of them.

"In the opinion of the undersigned the sand beaches of the north shore are so outstanding in their quality, extent and setting that consequently as great an area as possible of these should be included in any National Park set aside in Prince Edward Island. "To give access to these picturesque beaches stretches of adjoining territories will have to be included, but the exact areas and boundaries of such park lands can only be decided by a detailed survey, no large scale maps of the country contiguous to the beaches being obtainable.

"It is recommended however, that the park area should embrace sufficient land, not only to give ready access to the shore, but also to control contiguous territory so that nuisances and anything else repugnant to Park principles may be kept away from the area."

"In some cases this might involve including land not suitable for Park purposes, but it is thought the Province might co-operate by expropriating such properties and reconveying them with stipulations in the deed of reconveyance protecting Park interests."

Province Must Furnish Site

Under the federal proposition, the site for a National Park must be provided by the Province. With this in view an act was passed at the last legislative session authorizing the Provincial Government to expropriate lands for this purpose if necessary, and "a sum sufficient" was voted in the Estimates for the purchase of such lands.

The report of the federal officials now awaits consideration by the Campbell Government.

The following sites were inspected by the officials during their two week's visit here: Holland's Cove, Tea Hill, Mill River and Cascumpea area, Montrose and Kildare, Fortune Cove, Foxley River, Port Hill, Cherry Valley and Earncliffe, Dalvay, Bolger's Park, Bonshaw, DeSable Elliot River, St. Catherine and Argyle Shore, New London, Malpeque Bay, Holman's Island, McCallum's Point and Dunk River, Cavendish, Black Pond Area to East Point (near Souris), Fortune Bay (near Souris), Dundas and Morson's Pond, Brudenell River, Wightman's Point, Beach Grove.

Dupont Tieup With Germany Disclosed

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—(A.P.)—Details of what was characterized as "a most amazing contract," between the Dupont company and a man said to be Peter Brenner and described as an international spy, for the sale of munitions to Germany were dug out of reports of the United States Senate munitions committee today.

The report said the contract was destroyed the day after it was signed, Feb. 1, 1933, but the agent was nevertheless paid \$25,000 by the United States munitions firm. The committee disclosed the contract in connection with evidence about rearming Germany in violation of the Versailles Treaty. The Dupont firm declined comment.

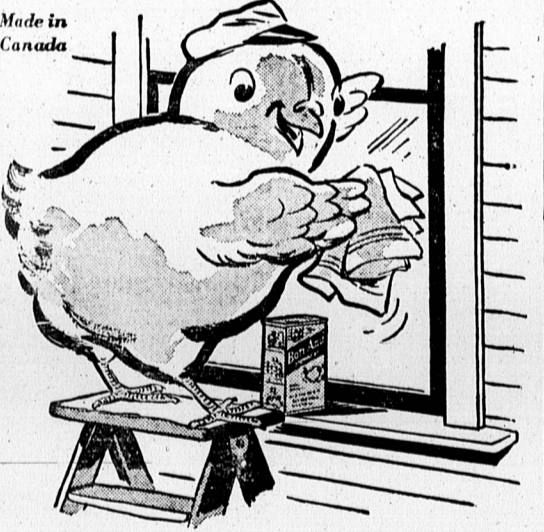

New York headquarters of the coast guard reported the Freighter El Amirante of the Southern Pacific Lines, 60 miles south of Cape Hatteras had requested assistance. The ship's message said a flange on its throttle valve was broken, causing steam to escape. The vessel is a 5,000-ton freight ship carrying a crew of 36.

Coast guard officials at Norfolk dispatched the cutter Modoc to aid the El Amirante. Coast guard officials said the Modoc should reach the El Amirante by morning.

A 68-mile gale was sweeping Cape Hatteras tonight and the barometer was dropping rapidly. At 11 p. m. A. D. T. the barometer was at 29.38.

Officials of the coast guard expressed concern for the safety of some 1,500 residents on the Hatteras banks, a stretch of land running 35 miles south of Nag's Head to Cape Hatteras. Reports brought here by motorists said parts of the highway between Manteo, N. C., and Nag's Head were under water. Along the New Jersey coast curling surf and heavy winds imperiled hundreds of lives by closing to small boats every inlet except one on more than 70 miles of coast. At Atlantic City 10,000 spectators watched the rescue of four men from a floundering 48-foot yacht.

Noted Financial Writer Passes

TORONTO, Sept. 17.—(C.P.)—Norman Harris, widely known as a financial writer, died suddenly at his home here last night. He was 60 years old.

Mr. Harris began his journalistic career as a reporter on the old Toronto World more than 40 years ago. He went to the New York Journal for three years and returned to Toronto to join the staff of the Evening Telegram.

Mr. Harris accepted an invitation to become financial editor of Toronto Saturday Night, later returning to the Telegram and then once again going to the Saturday-Night as editor of the "Gold and Dress" column. He was associated with the securities department of the Ontario Government for seven years. He is survived by one brother, Charles Beverley Harris, and one sister, Mrs. Henry Sprout, both of Toronto.
