(Special to The Guardian.) ST. JOHN, Jan. 26.—During thieves entered the Royal Hotel, here during Saturday afternoon. They entered a room occupied by Mr. and Mrs. L. P. Phayer of this City and removed a gold watch valued at \$200 and a wallet containing a considerable sum of money. In some manner the thieves evidently knew the ground. They mistook an envelop containing printed matter for one containing a valuable string of pearls. The robbery took place in mid afternoon during the absence of the occupants. Mr. Phayer had gone to another part of the hotel for a few minutes. When he returned he found the room in confusion and the articles missing. The room is directly above that occupied by Hon. L. J. and Mrs. Tweedie, when their room was entered some time ago and jewelry to the value of \$400 was stolen.

SECRET DISCLOSED

ROYAL ENGAGEMENT

(Canadian Press) BERLIN, Jan. 26.—The engagement of Prince Francis Joseph, heir to the House of Thurn and Taxis, to Archduchess Hedwige, Grand-daughter of the Emperor of Austria is reported. The Prince is heir to a fortune estimated at \$75,000,000. He is 21 and the Archduchess is 18.

EDITOR NAMED

FIRE IN WINNIPEG

ANDERSON DEFEATED BY HARRY LUDECKE

ST. JOHN, Jan. 24.—Harry Ludecke, a German, put it over Sam Anderson recently at Attleboro, Mass., as the following clipping from a paper of that city states: Sam Anderson of Boston met his match last night when he wrestled Harry Ludecke, the "Dark Horse," in Brownell hall, before a crowd of 300 devotees of the mat game. Ludecke, who came here a total stranger to everybody except Promoter Abbott, made a pronounced hit with the crowd by his clean tactics and the way in which he extricated himself from the holds of the tricky Anderson, who appeared to be in better form than ever before. In fact the match was one of the best ever held in this town, each man working aggressively, there being no stalling, so often seen in matches of this kind. When time was called the men came to the center of the mat and after a little sparring, they got to work in earnest. Sam had the German in several tight places but Ludecke with his great strength was able to work his way out. After about 15 minutes of fast wrestling, Anderson got a scissors hold, and held his man close to the mat but before he could pin the German's shoulders, he lost the hold and they were on their feet again. This was the closest that either man came to a fall until it had passed, when Ludecke worked a leg scissors and body hold and held Anderson's shoulders so the mat for the first fall. The exact time was 10 minutes and 32 seconds. After the intermission they came together again and had been wrestling only five minutes, when Anderson grabbed Ludecke by the legs, lifted him in the air and swung him around his head fully a dozen times, finally dropping him to the floor with a heavy thud, leaving the "Unknown" so dazed he didn't know where he was. It was an easy matter for Sam to secure a toe hold that was impossible to break and the German had to give in, rather than get a fractured leg. With one fall each to their credit, they started again, both men seeming anxious to get a quick fall. Within two minutes after time was called Anderson tried the "merry-go-round" stunt again but the German was prepared, and when he landed, quickly got out of reach until he could collect his scattered wits. Then, then, Sam was on the defensive and was busy breaking holds that Ludecke took. Finally, Ludecke's strength asserted itself, and he secured a body hold that the fast tiring Anderson could not get out of his shoulders being pinned to the mat after 12 minutes and 30 seconds had passed. The German was given an ovation by the crowd for his wonderful work to which he replied by saying that he had never appeared before a fairer crowd and that he appreciated their applause. Ludecke also announced that he was ready to meet any wrestler at his weight in the country preferably Kilonis. Anderson also spoke a few words, assuring the spectators that he was in a perfect condition but that the match was a better man and deserved to win.

LORD STRATHCONA BURIED AT HIGHGATE

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Jan. 26.—The body of Lord Strathcona was buried today with simple ceremony in Highgate Cemetery here. That of his wife, before interment the great funeral service was held in Westminster Abbey. The streets from Grosvenor Square to Abbey were lined by crowds of people, who reverently uncovered heads as the procession passed. The pallbearers were the Duke of Argyll, Earl Aberdeen and Marquis Lansdowne, all former Governors General of Canada, Earl of Lichfield, Sir Thomas V. Bowater, Lord Mayor of London; Rt. Hon. Lewis Harcourt, Secretary of State for the Colonies; Sir Wm. Osler, Sir Thomas Skinner and Prof. Smith, Vice-Chancellor of Aberdeen University. (Canadian Press) LONDON, Jan. 26.—The King and Queen, Queen Mother and Premier Asquith were present in the Abbey when most of the members of the Cabinet and foreign Ambassadors attended personally.

BARONS TO FIGHT A DUEL

(Canadian Press) PARIS, Jan. 26.—Martin announced that Baron Robert Le Vassasseur has begun proceedings against seven of the most prominent members of an exclusive Jockey Club having them summoned to appear before the correctional court. The proceedings arose out of the incident which occurred in a Card Room Club in 1910. Baron Le Vassasseur was accused of cheating but the incident was settled and considered closed. The charges were repeated several times since by M. Du Breuil, de Saint Germain, who refused to accept the Baron's challenge to a duel. Lamer appealed to the jury of honor declaring Saint Germain bound to fight or withdraw charges.

IN MEMORIAM

JAMES C. HUDSON

On Saturday morning December 20th, at his home in Cascumpe, P. E. I., after an illness of but fifteen hours James C. Hudson, one of the fathers in Israel, passed from earthly service to heavenly joy. Brother Hudson was born at Tryon, P.E.I., May 16th, 1848, and after spending his youth at home, in the autumn of 1875 moved to the West of the Province, settling at Cascumpe. On January 1st, 1879, he was married to Margaret Cameron of Tryon, who with two daughters and one son, Mrs. Robert Rankin of Alberton, P. E. I., Miss Ella, and Mr. Brenton at home, are left to mourn the loss of husband and father. As a young man more than forty years ago Brother Hudson was converted to God under the ministry of the Rev. Richard Smith in Tryon. Faithful to his Lord from the day of his surrender to Christ he grew through the years in spiritual fervour and blessed usefulness in earnest service as a Christian worker. Early in his Christian life he became a man of prayer and will long be remembered for his faithfulness before the throne of grace. In health on the Thursday evening, scarcely thirty hours before his death, he attended the meeting in the church, where in the four weeks of special services we had known many born anew in Christ, and in a prayer of rare spiritual beauty and power poured out his soul to God in humble confession and petition. The Holy Spirit was with us and we rejoiced in prayer and praise. But Brother Hudson served his Master on earth and is not for God took him. The funeral service, very largely attended, was conducted by the pastor, Rev. Henry S. B. Strothard, assisted by Rev. George Metherall, probationer, in the Cascumpe Church on Monday afternoon December 22nd. Brother Hudson's place in the work of the Church was a large one for he was for many years a loyal steward and trustee, a devoted exhorter, and for the last few years Sunday School Superintendent. From the labor of the Church mill-cant he passed to the joy of the Church triumphant and his character and work remain an inspiration to pastor and people in their ministry in the Kingdom.—H.S.B.S.
