 NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

Canada has many Parliaments great and small, the greatest of which is now in session at Ottawa. These Parliaments, whether federal or provincial, are, however, composed of men, elected by men. They are paid for attending the sittings, paid mileage for their journey to and from the place of meeting, and they have the power to make laws governing the greater affairs of the country and dealing with the lives and property of men, women and children.

Just now another Parliament has been sitting in the City of London, Ontario which in its way also represents the entire Dominion from the Atlantic to the Pacific. There are about half as many delegates present as sit in the Commons at Ottawa. But this is a Parliament of women, instead of men. It has no law making powers. Its members neither receive nor claim indemnity nor mileage. They travel and meet together at their own costs and charges. The Women's Parliament represents the women of Canada, who happen to be almost as numerous as the men. It is an august body, too, for the greatest ladies in the land are included among its office-bearers and members. But no pomp and circumstance of parade marks the opening of the session or signals its prorogation.

The other day when the National Council of women met at London Lady Taylor, wife of the Chief Justice of Manitoba, presided. Each member was presented with a badge of ivy leaves, tied with the Council colors of dark and light blue, and with the word "Altiior" written in gold letters on one of the leaves. These were sent out to them by the Countess of Aberdeen, the founder of the Women's Parliament in Canada, its first President and some time the head of the great International Council of the Women of all nations. The leaves had been gathered at Haddo, and the word "Altiior" was the legend which Her Excellency had left with the Council as a motto. With the charming souvenirs was sent a letter of kindly greetings couched in the tender and felicitous terms of which Lady Aberdeen is so capable.

Not unimportant are the deliberations and discussions of the National Council of Women, or the work in which it is engaged. Last year it issued an important Handbook on the "Women of Canada, Their Work and Interests," which was packed full of information upon vital matters which the ordinary parliamentary and departmental reports barely touch upon. The annual volume containing the reports presented and the papers read at the meetings of the National Council are as informing and important as those of any other gathering in Canada. At the first meeting in London this year reports from the various Provinces were read as follows: By Mrs. Boomer, Ontario; Miss Laidlaw, Quebec; Lady Tilley, New Brunswick; Mrs. Bryce, Manitoba; Mrs. McKenzie Cleland, British Columbia; Mrs. McMechan, Prince Edward Island; Mrs. MacIntosh, Nova Scotia, Mrs. Lawson, Northwest Territories.
 At the sectional conferences which followed the work of the Victorian Order of Nurses was reviewed, and the work of the Women's Historical Society was discussed. The evening session was devoted to the important subject of Health. At this meeting a number of the doctors who were in town

attending the Anti-Consumption League were present by invitation and gave addresses, to which was added a paper on Hygiene in Childhood in Reference to the Prevention of Tuberculosis, by Mrs. McKenzie Cleland, M. D. a member of the Council. Nothing can be of greater importance than the deep interest thus induced among the women of the country in public health, sanitation and the prevention of disease. Equally valuable is the interest taken by the Council in all that pertains to moral reform, the improvement of the condition of factory workers, the better supervision of prisons, work-houses, jails hospitals and lunatic asylums.

In fact the Women's Council is doing a great work as the federal head of all those organizations of women throughout the country which are furthering the progress of all enlightening, uplifting and humanitarian enterprises. It works with unequal success in different localities owing to local causes, but in its broad scope as an agency for moral and intellectual elevation throughout the Dominion it has already accomplished much, and is capable of yet doing much more. It was a happy thought to thus organize a body which should bring into activity or greater effectiveness the energies and intelligence of a large portion of the population, whose powers for public usefulness would have otherwise been in part misapplied or have remained dormant. We hope to see the work of the Council go on and prosper.
