## HINTS FOR The Motorist

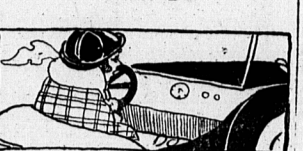

DRIVING GEARS MESH TOO DEEPLY



R. C. writes: After having had a new belt driving-gear installed in the rear-axle of my car, I notice that when I have driven around a turn or over rough going there is sometimes a rough grinding sound from the rear end like that made by drawing a stick over a washboard. The truss-rod under the axle is loose and I think that the mechanics disturbed the bearing adjustments when they put in the new gear. What had I better do? Answer: The natural assumption is that the thrust bearings which control the differential movement of the differential and driving gear are in such loose adjustment that the large gear can move so closely to the pinion that there is "bottoming" of the teeth of the two gears which would account for the noise which you describe. You better have these adjustments looked to at once making the setting such that the gear and pinion cannot mesh so closely but that a piece of paper can pass between their teeth without being caught. The truss-rod should be tightened but not enough to spring the housing out of line.

AMMETER FAILS TO SHOW CHARGE



A.H. asks: How can I tell whether the generator on my car is charging the battery? The starting system and the lighting system are wired separately and I think that the generator is not connected with the ammeter on the dashboard for the only time the ammeter registers is when the lights are on. Answer: We know of no system in which the ammeter is connected to show discharge and not charge and we think that if the generator were charging the ammeter would show it. It is possible that the generator fuse has blown, that the cut-out does not work to connect the generator into circuit or that the generator brush contacts are defective. A lamp connected on one side to ground and the other to the generator terminal inside the cut-out should light if the generator is all right and running at fair speed. If this proves to be the case, remove the cut-out housing and close the contacts with the finger and see if the ammeter shows charge.

## FIRE EXTINGUISHERS AND SO FORTH



C. D. B. asks the following questions: (1) Is a fire extinguisher necessary on an auto? (2) What size should be used and how much does one cost? (3) If one should pour some gasoline into the pan, with lots of oil there would it catch fire? (4) Does it do any harm to hold the clutch pushed out for a hundred feet or so?

Answer: (1) As a matter of common prudence, a fire-extinguisher ought to be carried on every car. Fifteen per cent. of the cost of fire insurance can be saved by so doing. (2) One containing a quart of liquid is the usual size and is found to be sufficient if handled properly and the fire is taken in time. A good one can be bought for \$9 or \$10. (3) It would be very likely to, if the ignition system produced a stray spark or there should happen to be an explosion through the carburetor and it certainly would create a very risky condition. (4) No. The clutch is intended to be used in this manner. However, it is not considered good practice to hold it out on long coasts, as this is unnecessarily hard on the clutch bearings.
