family he had to carry it home and cook it, but he wasn't going to take any unnecessary chances. Seeking out a secluded spot he made a thorough job of plucking the bird. The head and purple speculum on the wings, the two main identifying features on a black duck, were removed and to all appearances the bird would pass for a domesticated duck.

A short distance from his home he had to cross a secondary dirt road. Before stepping into the open he looked up and down the highway. The coast appeared clear. Alas, just as he reached the other side a car he recognized as a police vehicle, shot over a rise in the road. By this time he had reached the shelter of some trees on the opposite edge and quickly dropped the gun and plucked duck he was carrying into the bushes. The car continued on without stopping and he felt sure his quick action had saved him. He wasn't aware that two pairs of sharp eyes had observed his action.

Still, as I mentioned earlier, he was one of those cautious, surefire poachers, he wasn't taking any chances on retrieving his gun and game. He could return for them later when the coast was clear. He got an unpleasant surprise when he emerged empty handed though he was from the homeward side of the woods. Two R. C. M. Police officers were waiting for him. The gun and duck were quickly found.

"I thought" he informed the officers, "that the duck season was open. I read in the paper where it opened on September 15th." "You mean" spoke up one of the police, "that you read where the fishing season closed on September 15th." He couldn't resist offering a last excuse. "Do you know I had no idea of shooting ducks when I left home this afternoon. I was after crows. Maybe he didn't want to go home empty handed and a black duck was the nearest thing to a crow he could find."

His care in removing the head and wing feathers from the duck to prevent identification was labour wasted. He was dealing with two men who knew their birds and there was another way of telling what species of duck it was as well as being a wild one. He appeared in Court and his hunting episode cost him \$15.00 and his shotgun. As the immortal Bobbie Burns wrote: "The best laid schemes of mice and men."

There is a good crop of ducks on hand for the opening day but gunners are going to find them suffering from a severe attack of nervousness. Funs on the other hand are not showing up as well as expected and so far are well below last seasons record crop. Prospects were definitely brighter in early August. Many farmers have reported a good showing of young Huns during hatching but they appear to have vanished. It is feared that several heavy rains toward the latter part of August may have caused casualties among immature birds. There is a period in the development of Hungarian partridge when they are not fully feathered but are too large to be covered by their mothers. Sometimes when caught in the open in a downpour of cold rain they become chilled, and to all appearances are dead. After the manner of domestic chickens, but will revive if heat is applied.

Some optimistic sportsmen have expressed the opinion that the August crows that have vanished are still holding out in some out of the way corner in the rough land and will reappear later in the season. This columnist hopes that they are right but is frankly sceptical.

Four New York Rangers Players Are Injured

MONTREAL, Oct. 8 — (C P) — Four New York Rangers were brought to hospital here tonight after an automobile accident five miles this side of the Canadian border near Rouse's Point, N. Y.

Most severely injured were Hubert (Buddy) O'Connor, high-scoring centre, who suffered possible broken ribs, and defenceman Frankie Eddols, who received lacerations of one knee.

The others were centre Edgar Laprade, with broken nose, and defenceman Bill Moe, who had 15 stitches taken in a scalp wound.

Dr. George Little, who treated the players, said "all were unconscious when they arrived here."

"All are in fairly good condition except Edgar Laprade whose nose injury is extremely painful," said the doctor.

O'Connor, runner-up to Elmer Lach for the National Hockey League scoring title last season, told hospital authorities that their automobile was struck by a truck which came onto the main highway from a side road.

The players were en route to the Racers Saranac Lake, N. Y., training camp after playing a three-game exhibition series against Quebec amateur teams.

The 2-0 conquest over Boston Braves gave the Tribe a 2-1 edge in the classic, but no one seemed too elated about it.

Gene Bearden, who left-handed the Braves into submission, allowing five hits, was patted on the back in the quiet clubhouse by catcher Jim Hegan, who declared: "There was one game I could have caught from a rocking chair. This guy was terrific today."

It was pretty apparent that the Indians, although they need two more victories, don't expect to have to go back to Boston for either of them.

"Tomorrow is the big game," boss Lou Boudreau of the Tribe said. "That Johnny Sain can be tough. We found that out when he beat us in the first one. We'll start Steve Gronck."

CLEVELAND, Oct. 8 — (AP) — The silence was not only dead but deadly in Boston Braves dressing room.

The Boston players, who had won the opening game of the World Series only to fall behind with two straight losses, were conversing in low tones among themselves and with reporters who came in to ask what happened.
