SILVER FOX BREEDERS ASSN.

Sir:—About two weeks ago I addressed a letter to the members of the Association suggesting that it might be well to make a request for a special general meeting of the members of the Association with a view of giving the Directors an ex- pression of opinion of the members generally as to the standard of in- spection adopted this year.

In this letter I asked the members for an early reply, realizing that if a general meeting was to be called quick action was necessary in order to get relief this year. The replies however, did not come in in any number until about ten days after the publication of the letter and, as thirty days' notice of a general meet- ing has to be given, it can easily be seen that even if such meeting were called and action determined upon, it would be too late to do any good this year.

I therefore addressed a letter to Mr. Sharp, President of the Associa- tion, pointing out to him that the directors must be well aware of the general dissatisfaction and indigna- tion that existed among the mem- bers generally and suggested that, as the calling of a general meeting would be too late for any relief, an emergency meeting of the Directors might be held, and if any relief could be agreed upon, such relief could be given by the Directors at once. I have had no reply to this letter but I understand that an emergency meet- ing of the Directors is to be held in Toronto on Saturday of this week, practically all of the Directors being in Toronto attending the Winter Fair. Occasionally there comes to the screen an unheralded picture that proves to be a knockout. Such a picture is Universal's "The Shake- down," now showing at the Strand Theatre.

The leading roles in the production are entrusted to two of the screen's most promising youngsters, James Murray and Barbara Kent. The act- ing of these two is, at times, inspir- ing.
