The Mitchell Inquiry

A. Yes.
Q. Did he give you to understand that they were of independent means?
A. He did, yes.
Q. Do you know what land is selling for around there; were there any farms sold recently?
A. William May's farm across the road was sold about three years ago. It was bought by Mr. Hughes.
Q. How many acres?
A. About seventy-eight or eighty acres.
Q. What was paid for that?
A. \$6,900.
Mr. Gaudet:—
Q. Were there any buildings on that land?
A. The barn was torn down and they did not live in the house, but the land was good and high, though not very well cultivated.
Mr. Inman:—
Q. How does this land compare with your farm?
A. I would rather have my farm.
Q. How does the land compare in value apart from the buildings?
A. Per acre?
Q. Yes.
A. Our land is all fenced. There were no fences on that property at all. The rear end of our place is handy Emerald.
Q. How does the cultivation compare?
A. May did not cultivate it as much as he should.
Q. Was it as well cultivated as your farm?
A. No.

William H. Mayne (Sworn)
Mr. Inman: I wish to raise the same objection here to any evidence given by the witness with regard to private contracts.
The Commissioner: Your objection is noted.

Examination by the Attorney General:—
Witness examined Mr. Mollison's plan, and identified his land.
Q. Is all your farm included in that survey?
A. Yes.
Q. How many acres?
A. About two hundred acres. There are seventy acres across the line in Prince County.
Q. Was your land divided into blocks on the ground?
A. Not all. There was a field on the Preetown side of the road that had the outline surveyed. It was about eighteen acres, I think. It was not cut up into small lots.

Q. You know Andrew Fraser Mitchell?
A. Yes, I have met him.
Q. When?
A. Some time around the 20th he came to our place. I was a guest and I met him there first.
Q. Did you have any negotiations about the purchase of land?
A. Not that night. In general conversation he spoke about the scheme.

Q. What did he propose doing?
A. He was just discussing it in general conversation. There was nothing of a business nature at all that night.
Q. Did you have any business afterwards?
A. Yes. The next day he came to my house and we talked the matter over. He outlined his scheme and asked me if I would sell an option on my whole farm. I said I wanted a few hours to consider it. He said he had not very much time. We talked the matter over with my wife and we agreed on a price.
Q. Was an option taken?
A. Yes.
Q. What was the price?
A. \$100 an acre.
Q. The same as Mr. Sinclair's?
A. Yes.
Q. You have about the same kind of a farm?
A. Pretty much. Our land is practically all clear. There might be ten acres not cleared. There are a lot of buildings and a big double house.

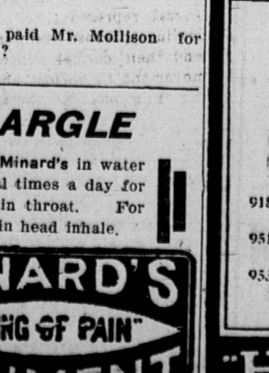
Mr. Gaudet:—
Q. Worth probably as much if not more than Mr. Sinclair's?
A. Land in that settlement is all worth a good price.
Q. But your buildings are just as valuable as Mr. Sinclair's?
A. Well, they are fair buildings, yes, but I am not prepared to say that.

Q. You have more out-buildings?
A. Yes. And we have a bigger house that probably you could not build for \$8,000 or \$9,000.
Q. How old is it?
A. One part is probably about thirty years and part of it less than twenty years. It is all in pretty good repair.

Q. Did you have a copy of the option?
A. No.
Q. But Mitchell took a copy?
A. Yes.
Q. Did he pay you anything on it?
A. No.
Q. Is it on the same terms as Mr. Sinclair's?
A. Yes, it is for \$100 an acre.
Q. Were the number of acres agreed to or was a survey suggested?
A. At the time we just spoke about the deeds.
Q. That would be for about 200 acres?
A. Yes.
Q. You paid Mr. Mollison for the survey?
A. Yes.
